

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

# **President's Message**

At the time of writing this, it has been just over 8 and a half months since I took over the office of President of the Law Society. It feels longer than that. But an interesting journey always feels longer both because of the many and memorable milestones along the way.

Notwithstanding that I had been in Council for 3 years prior to being elected President, 2 as Vice-President, one never truly appreciates the scope and breadth of the job until actually stepping into the shoes of one's predecessor.

I must record my deepest thanks to the men and women of the Secretariat, sometimes overworked, often under-appreciated, but consistently dedicated even in the face of harassment, unreasonable demands and uncalled for criticism. They solider on, nonetheless. I record my gratitude to their considerable patience in dealing with my incessant queries, suggestions and occasional ignorance of the subject matter at hand with the utmost equanimity.

Some Council members, Committee chairs, Committee members and other volunteers, display an incredible sense of engagement and ownership, far over and above the call of duty. I am awed by their spirit of service, true selflessness and commitment. It is a privilege to serve amongst them and be counted in their number.

I am fortunate to be able to build on the work of my two predecessors, Wong Meng Meng, SC and Lok Vi Ming, SC. I served in each of their Councils. Where we are today, and where we are headed, is part of a continuing plan to equip and modernise the Law Society and legal profession to face the challenges of the 21st Century, to ensure that we remain relevant to the legal and wider community. The Law Society is and must continue to be the voice of the profession, and a fundamental pillar of civil society

committed to upholding the Rule of Law and the independence of the Bar.

In this regard, events in Malaysia and the actions taken by my counterparts across the causeway have given me cause to reflect. I have nothing but admiration for my learned friends in the Malaysian Bar Council. The challenges they face are vastly different from ours. Their relationships with the government, judiciary and the authorities are, to put it kindly, sometimes confrontational, often tense. We suffer under no such impediments in our dealings with our judiciary, government, attorneygeneral's chambers and regulatory authorities. The relationships are constructive, respectful and most importantly, productive - the Singapore way, where things get done sans drama, where we can disagree dispassionately yet strive for common ground, and where sometimes progress is steady and incremental, instead of explosive.

2015 has been exciting, and here is a nonexhaustive list. JustWalk was unprecedented in its wide participation and the awareness that it raised. We kicked off enhanced CLAS, many years in the making, and a game changer in the pro bono eco-system. We've seen the introduction of the Professional Conduct rules, where we played a vital role in modernising them and ensuring as far as possible, a level playing field amongst domestic and foreign lawyers. FATF required Singapore to institute wide ranging anti-money laundering laws across various professions, including ours. The Law Society worked hard to ensure that the regulatory burden on our members was kept as reasonably as the law allowed. The conduct of lawyers came under scrutiny and we had to devise plans to get our house in order as part of our aspirations to call ourselves world class lawyers. A pilot scheme to video police interviews was approved and we got the pamphlet of rights into police stations. Our first Honorary Member, Mr Lee Kuan Yew passed

away and I had the privilege of leading a delegation of Council members and former Law Society Presidents to Sri Temasek to pay our respects at the private wake. We won the Bench & Bar Games with our biggest ever margin, and as a bonus, also won the boat race!

But Council still has much to do - again, I offer a non-exhaustive list. We need to look at the young lawyers' exodus at the senior associate level, and consider how we can encourage greater longevity in the profession. The possible introduction of flexible fee arrangements is an issue which consistently arises in a competitive globalised market. The inaugural Malaysia/Singapore Summit will take place on 23 October in Kuala Lumpur. We hope to make this an annual tradition where we can share knowledge, discuss issues, and build networks. The LSRA becomes operational soon, and we need to adapt to this. While addressing our members' standards of behaviour in our aspiration for a world class legal profession, we also need to have a more systematic and rational way to deal with complaints against judicial officers. We continue to consider possible legislative changes to the LPA to rationalise and keep it relevant, including the expansion of the middle category; changes to the SAR to make things easier for lawyers and law firms; changes to the Compensation Rules to make it easier to use the surplus funds to provide a library for our members; increased powers to Council to impose a greater range of less draconian and more constructive measures when exercising our disciplinary function. That's just a taster of what is on the plate for the next year and beyond.

There are frustrations, irritations and occasional moments of outright absurdity. One instance I remember was when the mainstream media carried the story that I had been elected President. I was encouraged by many congratulatory messages and notes of goodwill and support. But there was

one e-mail from an opposing party whom I had previously cross-examined, saying that I was being sent a message of "non-congratulations"! Perhaps this was akin to the apocryphal "dislike" button on Facebook. The ridiculousness of the moment actually made my day. I can only conclude that having a sense of humour, and not taking oneself too seriously, keeps one sane. While I sometimes still quip that I'm doing "national service", the irreducible truth remains that serving our profession as Law Society President is an honour, a privilege and oftentimes an education.

Is it still the "least enviable job in the legal profession"? Not any more.

# **CEO's Report**

During the reporting year, there were a number of developments in the legal industry which set significant milestones for the legal profession in Singapore. The Law Society had a busy year launching various new initiatives for its members and the community. This report highlights how the legal profession and the Law Society have worked together during the year as advocates for the legal profession and the wider community.

#### THE YEAR IN REVIEW

#### I. Pro Bono Services

#### 1. Enhanced Criminal Legal Aid Scheme ("CLAS")

Enhanced CLAS was officially launched on 18 May 2015 by the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Law, Mr K Shanmugam. The enhanced CLAS aims to serve up to 6,000 accused persons each year. CLAS has also been enhanced to cover an expanded range of criminal offences, and will offer assistance to applicants who intend to plead guilty.

CLAS will continue to be run by the Law Society's Pro Bono Services Office ("PBSO"), with the Government providing funding which will cover initial start-up costs, and an annual commitment to defray operational costs, honoraria and disbursements. The Law Society will continue to independently raise funds to cover the rest of the costs. The enhanced CLAS will now be able to serve many more accused persons facing criminal charges.

To serve the potential bigger pool of people seeking assistance, the following 3 mechanisms to grow the pool of lawyers for CLAS have been implemented:

(i) Lead Lawyers - Senior criminal law practitioners appointed as Lead Lawyers will provide basic legal advice, assess the merits of a case and decide on the level of aid to be given;

- (ii) CLAS Fellows Law firms will second or sponsor lawyers to work full-time at the PBSO exclusively on CLAS cases; and
- (iii) Memorandums of Understanding 16 law firms have pledged to take on almost 250 CLAS cases per year between them.

Other key features of the enhanced scheme are:

- (i) An enhanced means test will allow more applicants to qualify for criminal legal aid. Persons with a disposable income of not more than \$10,000 per annum and a disposable capital of not more than \$10,000 may be granted aid;
- (ii) Co-payment to ensure that applicants also contribute towards their defence, and do not abuse the system; and
- (iii) Honoraria to be paid to lawyers as a token of appreciation for their pro bono contributions.

#### 2. Community Legal Clinics

Following the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Mayors' Committee on 12 September 2014, PBSO is expanding its Community Legal Clinic ("CLC") network by inviting non-PBSO administered clinics to join the network. The CLC network aims to offer free resources, information and manpower (through volunteer mobilisation).

PBSO is also introducing a new mentoring programme for its CLCs to allow senior lawyers to provide guidance to their junior counterparts. This mentoring programme will take the form of a 3 to 6 month onsite "buddy" system and/or a "Mentoron-call" system, where senior lawyers (based on areas of specialisation) provide assistance and/or guidance to junior lawyers during clinic sessions via telephone.

#### 3. Law Awareness Week

The 5 Community Development Councils ("CDCs") of Singapore collaborated with the Law Society to host Law Awareness Week 2015 @ CDC ("LAW").

This is the first time that the CDCs are working with the Law Society to introduce a series of law talks to the residents in the public and private estates across the 5 CDC districts.

More than 30 legal awareness talks were organised for the public during LAW held from 20-26 July 2015. The talks were held at locations close to the community in the heartlands, and covered a wide range of legal topics including Employment Law, Consumer Protection Law, Cyber Wellness, Privacy and Intellectual Property Rights and Advance Planning. The presentations were tailored to non-legally trained audiences, with the intention of breaking the "legal jargon" down into easy-to-understand elements. The aim of these presentations was to promote awareness, instil a basic understanding of the law, and empower Singaporeans to navigate basic legal issues.

The revised Know the Law ("KTL") booklet was also launched and distributed at the LAW launch event. The KTL booklet is a legal guide for members of the public on various topics of Singapore Law relevant to everyday life.

#### 4. Justice for All Project – Just Walk Fundraiser

The Justice for All project was launched in 2014, and includes plans to enhance CLAS and make legal knowledge accessible to more in Singapore. Justice for All aims to increase the collaborative efforts and engagement between the legal fraternity and other sections of the community, including voluntary welfare organisations and corporations outside of the legal industry. Apart from legal representation for criminal matters, the project aims to involve more lawyer-volunteers to play a larger role in the spread of legal knowledge in Singapore's everchanging legal landscape.

As part of the PBSO's fund raising efforts, Justice for All was kicked off by a Charity Walkathon titled "Just Walk" on 10 January 2015 which coincided with Singapore's celebration of SG50. This inaugural walkathon was a tremendous success, with approximately 2,000 lawyers, friends from the legal fraternity and our stakeholders participating, walking past key legal institutions such as the Supreme Court, the State Courts, Attorney-General's Chambers, Ministry of Law and the Law

Society of Singapore. The walkathon raised \$2 million which includes a dollar-for-dollar funding contribution from the Government's Care and Share grant. The funds raised will go towards the outreach work to increase legal awareness, as well as to support the PBSO's key initiatives, enhanced CLAS and Community Legal Clinics.

### 5. Appropriate Adults Volunteer Mobilisation Scheme

In 2012, the Attorney-General's Chambers formed a committee tasked to explore ways to improve the communication between a person with intellectual or mental disabilities ("PWID") and the law enforcement authorities. This led to the pilot run of the Appropriate Adult Scheme at Bedok Police Division, administered by the Law Society, where specially trained volunteers (Appropriate Adults) acted as the bridge between the Investigation Officer and the PWID. The presence of the adults facilitated the interview process and enabled PWIDs to understand the Officer's queries and communicate more effectively.

Following its successful pilot run which assisted close to 50 PWIDs, the scheme will now be rolled out to all 6 police land divisions in 2015. The PBSO which administers the scheme, is targeting to increase the current pool of Appropriate Adults from 60 to more than 300 volunteers in order to facilitate the scheme's expansion.

Law Society and the Central Singapore Community Development Council ("CDC") launched the Appropriate Adult Volunteers Mobilisation on 31 March 2015. Central Singapore CDC will, through its extensive network of community partners, create awareness of the scheme and to help mobilise volunteers.

#### II. Legal Practice

#### A. Key Consultations

The Law Society was involved in several private and public consultations during the reporting period. The key consultations are highlighted in the next page.

#### 1. Professional Conduct Rules

The Committee to Review the Regulatory Framework of the Singapore Legal Services Sector (the "Committee") submitted its recommendations to the Ministry of Law on 21 January 2014. The Government accepted the recommendations by the Committee which included the establishment of a new entity regulator, the Legal Services Regulatory Authority ("LSRA").

The LSRA will regulate all law practice entities in Singapore. Existing regulatory functions performed by the Law Society of Singapore (for Singapore law practices) and the Attorney-General's Chambers (for foreign law practices and registration of foreign lawyers) will be transferred to the LSRA.

Legal Disciplinary Practices ("LDPs") will be permitted, where non-lawyer managers/ employees will be allowed to own equity and/or share in the profits of the LDP. LDPs will only be allowed to provide legal services. The LSRA will regulate LDPs.

The LSRA is expected to be established in the fourth quarter of this year.

# 2. Prevention of Money Laundering and Financing of Terrorism

Singapore is a member of the Financial Action Task Force ("FATF") which is an inter-governmental body established in 1989. The objectives of the FATF include setting standards and promoting effective implementation of legal, regulatory and operational measures for combating money laundering and terrorist financing.

The FATF conducts an evaluation exercise involving each member on an ongoing basis to assess levels of implementation of the standards set by the FATF. In November 2015, FATF will conduct an on-site assessment of the implementation of the prevention of money laundering and financing of terrorism standards in Singapore. FATF will assess how well the legal profession does in applying client due diligence and record keeping measures.

Part VA of the Legal Profession Act on the Prevention of Money Laundering and Financing of

Terrorism, and the Legal Profession (Prevention of Money Laundering and Financing of Terrorism) Rules (the "Rules") came into operation on 23 May 2015. The Rules closely follow the standards set by the FATF. The Council of the Law Society has issued a Practice Direction on the Prevention of Money Laundering and Financing of Terrorism which took effect from 23 July 2015. This Practice Direction sets out directions and guidance on Part VA of the Legal Profession Act and the Rules.

The Council of the Law Society will continue to assist members to understand their obligations under Part VA of the Legal Profession Act and the Rules through seminars and materials on the Law Society's website and the Law Gazette.

#### **B.** Other Legal Initiatives

#### 1. PDPC Hotline

The Law Society launched the Personal Data Protection Act Legal Advice Scheme on 1 June 2015 in collaboration with the Personal Data Protection Commission. The Scheme has been designed as a one-hour basic legal consultation for Small and Medium Enterprises regarding their compliance with the Personal Data Protection Act.

#### 2. Primary Justice Project

In 2014, the Law Society worked with the State Courts and Community Justice Centre in starting up the Primary Justice Project ("PJP"). This year, the Law Society participated in discussions to enhance the scope of the PJP scheme to include Prevention of Harassment Act ("POHA") and criminal law matters.

#### **III. Membership Initiatives**

#### 1. Mission to India

The Law Society together with Ministry of Law, Singapore International Commercial Court, Singapore International Mediation Centre and Singapore International Arbitration Centre organised a Mission to India to promote Singapore's full suite of international dispute resolution services and to promote Singapore as a choice location to resolve international commercial disputes.

The Mission was held from 7 to 10 September 2015 in New Delhi and Mumbai. More than 30 lawyers from Singapore took part in the Mission. As part of the mission, a seminar to interact with the business community and an evening networking event to engage with members of the Indian Bar were organised. Over 180 lawyers in India attended the seminar and networking events, and the participants included managing partners and senior partners of Indian law firms.

#### 2. Memorandums of Understanding ("MOUS")

To promote and strengthen the cooperation between the Law Society of Singapore and overseas bar associations and the exchanges between Singapore lawyers and lawyers in overseas jurisdictions, the Law Society signed 5 MOUs during the period of reporting with the following regional bar associations - Guangxi Lawyers' Association, Shenzhen Lawyers Association, Korean Bar Association, Daini Tokyo Bar Association and Japan Federation of Bar Associations.

In addition, Law Society and Japan Federation of Bar Associations jointly organised a seminar, Globalisation of Legal Practices - An Asian Perspective, in Singapore on 22 June 2015.

#### 3. Council and Committee Lunches

The Council held regular bi-monthly lunches at the State Courts Bar Room to update members on developments within the profession. These were well attended by members, and Council looks forward to continuing the practice of regularly meeting with members at these lunches.

The Small Law Firms Committee and State Courts Committee have also organised regular lunches with members throughout the year. These sessions have been organised for members to discuss the latest practice developments, interact with other members and provide feedback on issues that impact the profession.

# 4. Rental of Meeting Rooms at the Society's Headquarters

The Law Society's renovations at 39 South Bridge Road were completed in November 2014, with the building officially re-opened on 18 November

2014 by past Presidents of the Society, followed by a simple open house for members. Over the past couple of months, we have had the pleasure of hosting members, overseas delegates and local guests at our renovated premises. The "new" premises now comfortably accommodate 45 Secretariat staff, with the capacity to accommodate up to 60.

One of the main aims of the renovations was to make available additional meeting room space for use by our Committees and our members. Since May 2015, we have been pleased to open up our meeting rooms for booking by members at reasonable rates. The take-up so far has been encouraging, with meeting rooms open for booking between 10:00am and 5:00pm on weekdays (excluding public holidays), subject to availability.

#### 5. Additional Amenities for State Courts Bar Room

Based on feedback from members, an extra television set was installed during the year to stream news programmes such as Channel News Asia for the convenience of members in the State Courts Bar Room.

# IV. Continuing Professional Development ("CPD")

#### 1. Statistics

The Law Society's CPD programmes continue to perform well this past year. Over 70 seminars, workshops and conferences were organised and supported by the Society from 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, which attracted more than 5,600 registrations from both members and non-members.

#### 2. Phase 2 Mandatory CPD

Phase 2 of the Mandatory CPD Scheme came into effect in January 2015. Practitioners with up to 15 years of practice experience are now required to fulfil mandatory CPD requirements. The increase in number of practitioners requiring CPD points has resulted in an increase in demand for the Society's CPD activities. The CPD Committee, together with the various practice Committees of the Society have stepped up to the challenge by designing

and developing more CPD activities for members throughout the course of this year.

#### 3. eLearning

Besides face-to-face CPD activities, the Law Society is committed to exploring other channels of providing CPD activities to our members. Online e-learning programmes were launched in November 2014 and a webinar was organised for our members in August 2015 – a first for the Law Society. We will continue to explore new ways of providing CPD activities to our members in a cost effective manner, whilst ensuring ease of access.

# **Treasurer's Report**

The financial year ended 31 March 2015 has been another busy year for the Law Society. The year has seen a continued increase in the scope of activities undertaken by the Society in terms of continuing professional development and pro bono work. Prudence in cost control continues to be one of the core values of the Society, and this has enabled the Society to maintain a healthy surplus this year.

The Finance Committee is a standing committee of the Council of the Law Society of Singapore. Our principal functions include:

- Working with the Secretariat to prepare the Society's overall budget for Council's approval;
- Working with the respective Committees to prepare detailed annual work plan budgets for Council's approval;
- Developing the financial and investment policies and guidelines for the Society;
- Reviewing the Society's financial investments and appointment of bankers;
- Reviewing financial protocols and internal controls of the Society;
- Ensuring financial accountability to Council, the Society and its members;
- Generally aligning the Society's financial resources and procedures with the overall objectives and goals of the Society.

The Finance Committee comprises the Treasurer and 6 other members. The members are Gregory Vijayendran, Adrian Chan, Gary Pryke, Kelvin Wong, Michael S. Chia and Usha Chandradas. We are assisted in the discharge of our work by the Chief Executive Officer and Finance Department of the Secretariat. The Finance Committee meets at least once a month.

This report covers the main highlights of the financial performance of the Society during the

financial year ended 31 March 2015 (*Current Financial Year*).

# INCOME AND EXPENDITURE - GENERAL FUND

Our General Fund reported a before-tax surplus of \$1.04 million for the Current Financial Year (cf a before-tax surplus of \$1.33 million for the financial year ended 31 March 2014 (*Previous Financial Year*). Total income in the Current Financial Year increased by 9% to \$6.03 million whilst total expenditure increased to \$4.99 million.

#### Income

The main factor which contributed to the 9% increase in income was the increase in subscriptions received from practising members which increased by about 5% to \$4.60 million, in line with an increase in the total number of practising members from 4,741 to 4,997.

Net surplus (before overheads allocation) from Continuing Professional Development ("CPD") programmes and conferences increased to \$980,429 (cf \$682,447 in the Previous Financial Year) due to more conferences being held during the financial year.

Investment income, income from fixed deposits and revenue from advertisements in the Society's directory and classifieds has remained relatively constant.

Other income declined to \$97,002 from \$120,837 due mainly to a decline in penalty collections during the year. These were recovered subsequent to financial year end.

#### **Expenditure**

The following are the main reasons for the increase in total expenditure to \$4.99 million, an increase of 18% or \$768,986:

- Administrative expenses have increased from \$0.60 million to \$0.86 million, with the increase largely due to the increase in depreciation expenses in relation to the renovations at 39 South Bridge Road and the State Courts Bar Room:
- There was an increase in the Society's mandatory contribution to the SILE, from \$473,760 in the Previous Financial Year, to \$494,930, in line with the increase in ordinary members;
- The Society increased its donation to support the activities of Pro Bono, Learning and Support Services, from \$570,000 in the Previous Financial Year, to \$650,000;
- Expenditure for Council's activities (including meetings and events) has increased from \$88,699 in the Previous Financial Year, to \$145,731; and
- Expenditure on regulatory matters amounted to \$213,653 compared to a Previous Financial Year surplus of \$139,497 due to an over provision of fees written back in the Previous Financial Year.

# INCOME AND EXPENDITURE - COMPENSATION FUND

The increase in net overall surplus, from \$362,100 in the Previous Financial Year, to \$697,517 can be attributed to the following:

- Total income increased by 5% to \$761,385, due mainly to members' contribution in line with the increase in number of our members.
- Total expenditure decreased from \$362,100 in the Previous Financial Year to \$63,868, as no grants were paid in the Current Financial year under Section 75(9) of the Legal Profession Act.

#### INCOME AND EXPENDITURE - PRO BONO LEARNING AND SUPPORT SERVICES FUND

There was an overall surplus of \$537,867 for the Current Financial Year, compared to a surplus of \$149,433 in the Previous Financial Year.

• A 27% increase in income to \$3.03 million resulting from an increase in donations received, including donations from:

- Increase in expenditure of 11% to \$2.49 million, attributable to:
  - » Increase in administrative expenditure to \$383,114 (cf \$198,872 for the Previous Financial Year), due to the rental cost of the PBSO Office at Market Street and higher depreciation costs for the renovations at the PBSO Office at State Courts, in line with the needs of Enhanced CLAS.

#### **OTHER FUNDS**

 Other Funds comprise the Sports Meet Fund, Welfare Fund, Library Fund, Jus Curio Fund and Pastoral Care Fund;  Overall, there was a deficit of \$4,621 for the Other Funds (cf a surplus of \$10,218 in the Previous Financial Year). This was mainly due to the decrease in the surplus for the Jus Curio Fund due to a decline in sales.

#### **BALANCE SHEET**

The key highlights of the balance sheet of the Society as at 31 March 2015 are as follows:

- General Fund reserves stood at \$16.71 million, an increase of about 7.7%, principally from the surplus for the Current Financial Year.
- General Fund total assets amounted to \$18.37 million, including \$5.76 million being held as fixed deposits, cash at bank and in hand, and \$4.05 million being held as bonds and equity investments;
- Compensation Fund total assets amounted to \$12.28 million, including \$6.51 million being held as fixed deposits, cash at bank and in hand, and \$5.08 million being held as bonds and equity investments;
- General Fund total liabilities stood at \$1.66 million, partly in relation to advance payment of the application fees for the practising certificates for FY2015/2016, which were received prior to 31 March 2015;
- The Society had no external borrowings;
- The Society continues to invest in blue-chip securities and bonds which provide a conservative yet steady return to keep up with inflation. The average yield derived from bonds is about 3.1% per annum. The net income from investments was \$310,266 (cf \$329,656 in the Previous Financial Year). There was a surplus of \$580,923 in the fair value reserve of the Society's investments (representing the increase in the market value as at 31 March 2015 over the historical transacted price. The coming year will be an even busier one, with a projected increase in the activities of the various sub-committees, and the expansion and advancement of the Society in the pro bono space. The Society will also work hard to obtain additional sources of funding to support the myriad of existing and new pro bono initiatives run by the Society's Pro Bono Services Office, and this will be one of the main challenges for the coming year.




The external auditors, Messers Baker Tilly TFW LLP issued a clean audit opinion on the financial



# **Pro Bono, Learning and Support Services**

#### **Vision and Mission**

An important part of the mission of the Law Society of Singapore is to serve the community by facilitating access to justice.

The Law Society of Singapore actively promotes pro bono work to address the legal needs of those who cannot afford legal services. Over the years, it has initiated and implemented numerous pro bono programmes to provide comprehensive pro bono legal assistance for the most disadvantaged in our community as well as for organisations serving the needy.

# The Law Society of Singapore Pro Bono, Learning and Support Services

The Law Society of Singapore Pro Bono, Learning and Support Services ("PLSS") is the Law Society's charity which oversees the Law Society's pro bono initiatives.

PLSS was established by the Law Society to:

- a. implement the Law Society's vision and initiatives as to the provision of pro bono legal services in Singapore;
- coordinate the provision of civil, criminal and community pro bono work between the Law Society and other agencies;
- c. conduct and coordinate, on an ongoing basis, volunteer recruitment drives for pro bono services, manage and monitor activities of volunteers, and organise and implement training initiatives for volunteers;
- d. identify pro bono opportunities; and
- e. oversee all of the Law Society's pro bono initiatives.

Policies adopted by PLSS during the financial year in pursuance of the Charity's objectives have included policies to:

- a. facilitate the recruitment and mobilization of volunteers for pro bono services through:
  - i. the presentation of a range of pro bono volunteer opportunities catering to different interests, time commitments and legal/ practice expertise; and
  - ii. the transfer of skills, know-how and a positive pro bono spirit from senior volunteers to junior volunteers.
- b. facilitate volunteer networking, the transfer and dissemination of information and ideas among volunteers and the organic development of pro bono initiatives to meet needs/gaps in the legal assistance framework.
- encourage law practices to support their lawyers to volunteer for pro bono work.

The PLSS Management Committee comprises Mrs Arfat Selvam (Chairperson), Mr George Lim, SC, Mr N Sreenivasan, SC, Ms Malathi Das, Mr Thio Shen Yi ,SC (up to 31 December 2014), Mr Kelvin Wong (Treasurer up to 31 December 2014), Mr Gregory Vijayendran and Ms Kuah Boon Theng (member and Treasurer from 1 January 2015 respectively).

PLSS's IPC status was extended for a period of 3 years with effect from 1 April 2013.

The Community Legal Clinic Committee was formed in August 2014 to oversee the implementation of the Community Legal Clinics Expansion Plan. The members of this committee include volunteer lawyers who have been and/or who are still actively volunteering with the Community Legal Clinics.

The expansion of the Community Legal Clinic network was planned in 2 phases:



This phase would involve only a re-allocation of resources as the plan was to hold one legal clinic on any one night (Mondays to Thursdays) at 4 CDCs, namely north west, south east, central Singapore and south west. Each of these clinics would then be designated the Community Legal Hub for each district. This was completed by end September 2014.

North east district has mature clinics and it was decided that one of the existing clinics would be designated the north east Community Legal Hub.

In support of this expansion, a Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") was signed between the Mayor's Committee and the Law Society of Singapore on 12 September 2014 to formalise the collaboration.



This phase would involve bringing all the existing "satellite" clinics held at CCs/Community Clubs around the island into the network through the adoption of our clinic manual and the introduction of "best practices" into each clinic across the network.

A briefing was held on 13 August 2014 for clinics who would be interested to join the network on the expansion plans to keep them updated on the expansion plans and how they could have access to insurance coverage, increased volunteer pool and other resources if they join the network.

To-date, we have 8 clinics who have confirmed that they will join the expanded network and an

MOU, together with Standard Operating Procedure will be signed with these clinics to formalise their participation.



# A. Applications for Criminal Legal Aid Scheme ("CLAS"), Community Court and Remand Clinic Cases

From 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, a total of 1,913 applications for aid were received under CLAS (Enhanced). Aid granted for the said period for a total of 1018 applications. Of this, 810 applications were granted aid under the Enhanced CLAS since January 2015. The number of cases processed upto August 2015 in comparison to 2014 increased by 53% with more than 800 more applicants qualifying for criminal legal aid under the enhanced scheme.

#### **B. Volunteers**

There were 279 CLAS volunteer lawyers in 2015 who had taken up at least 1 case in the period up to 31 August 2015. This was an increase from the number of volunteer lawyers who took up cases during the same period in 2014.

About 35 lawyers assisted with Community Court cases and/or legal advice in Remand Clinic cases.

CLAS's other volunteers include law students from the National University of Singapore, Singapore Management University, overseas law students from various universities, local "A" level students, in-house counsel from local and overseas entities who continue to volunteer their time to assist CLAS counsel with research. In addition to our Bangladeshi, Burmese, Indian, Thai, and Vietnamese interpreters who assisted CLAS on a pro bono basis, we also continue to receive support from our panel of about 20 volunteer psychiatrists and psychologists, who have been referred some 40 cases.

#### C. CLAS Expenditure

Please refer to the financial statement in this Annual Report for complete information regarding CLAS's expenditure and income. CLAS's expenditure for Annual Report Year 2015 has been \$\$\$1,307,301.79. Below is a table of comparison in terms of CLAS's expenditure since 2012 to 2014. The increase in expenditure is mainly due to an increase in staff expenses, disbursements and honorarium pay-outs. The deficit figure of \$759,040.07 for 2015 stated below has not yet taken into account the Ministry of Law's annual commitment of up to \$3.5 million to cover operational costs, honoraria and disbursements, which would significantly reduce the deficit figure for 2015

#### D. Enhanced CLAS

The Law Society of Singapore and the Ministry of Law announced on 19 May 2015 a wide range of enhancements to the Criminal Legal Aid Scheme ("Enhanced CLAS"). The said enhancements were

launched by the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Law, Mr K Shanmugam. Since the launch, Enhanced CLAS now features various tiers of assistance, and is projected to serve more accused persons incrementally over the next 5 years and eventually serve up to 6,000 accused persons annually. This will be more than a tenfold increase. This is a more than tenfold increase from the numbers CLAS that had previously been served. CLAS will now also offer assistance to applicants who intend to plead guilty.

#### **Background**

In November 2013, the Ministry of Law announced that it would start funding criminal legal aid. Subsequently, it also announced the formation of a Criminal Legal Assistance Steering Committee to oversee the policies governing the disbursement of government funds for the purposes of criminal legal aid.

Chaired by the then Justice Tan Siong Thye with the then President of the Law Society, Mr Lok Vi Ming, SC as the Vice-Chairman, the Steering Committee was started in 2014. The Steering Committee consists of representatives from the Law Society, the Criminal Bar, the Courts, Singapore Academy of Law and MinLaw. Senior Minister of State for Education and Law Indranee Rajah serves as an advisor to the Steering Committee, along with Judge of Appeal Justice Chao Hick Tin. The current Chairman of the Committee is Presiding Judge of the State Courts, Judicial Commissioner See Kee Oon. The Vice-Chairman is now the current President of the Law Society, Mr Thio Shen Yi, SC.

By end 2014, the Steering Committee completed its formulation of the policy framework for the enhanced CLAS, in consultation with the Criminal Bar. The enhanced CLAS was soft launched in January 2015 based on the new framework.

CLAS continues to be managed by the Law Society, with the Government providing the bulk of the funding which covers \$800,000 for initial start-up costs, and an annual commitment of up to \$3.5 million to cover operational costs, honoraria and disbursements. The Law Society continues to raise funds to cover the rest of the costs. The enhanced

CLAS now is able to serve many more accused persons facing criminal charges.

CLAS was featured widely in the print media, online and on television in Singapore.

#### Features of Enhanced CLAS

For a quick guide to how it works:

- The Pro Bono Services Office ("PBSO") will continue to run CLAS.
- Means Testing

There will be means testing to ensure that criminal legal aid is given to those with genuine financial need. Accused persons helped have to pass both a means and merits test. They will be required to submit their pay slips or CPF statements, and an application form, before turning up to apply for assistance.

Co-payment is required

Co-payment will be required from those with an annual disposable income of between S\$2,000 to S\$10,000, assessed at the time of the application.

Screening by Lead Lawyers (i.e. the Merits Test)

The starting point is to distinguish cases which merit assistance from those which do not. Under enhanced CLAS, senior criminal lawyers will interview applicants, make an initial assessment of the case and provide basic legal advice. They will decide if full representation ought to be granted. Whilst aid was previously granted only for vulnerable applicants (regardless of plea) and cases where the applicant claimed trial, aid under Enhanced CLAS is also provided to applicants who wish to plead guilty now, as long as they will benefit from representation.

Assigned Counsel

Once cleared by the Lead Lawyers, cases will be assigned to volunteer lawyers, or the CLAS Fellows

Honoraria

Under Enhanced CLAS, volunteer lawyers will be paid an honoraria for cases on full representation. While not the same as market rate, the honoraria will go some way towards defraying their legal fees. Disbursements will continue to be covered so volunteer lawyers need not incur out-of-pocket expenses. Lawyers who prefer not to receive honoraria can donate the sum back to PBSO or CLAS

Memorandum of Understanding

Under Enhanced CLAS, 22 law firms have also signed Memorandums of Understanding ("MOUs") with the Law Society to take on more than 300 CLAS cases per year. These firms are:-

#### Structured Mentoring Programme

One of the drawbacks of the original CLAS programme was that young lawyers or those who did not have criminal experience who wanted to volunteer did not have sufficient experience in criminal law matters. This discouraged them from volunteering. It also does not serve the client's interest. To address this, the Enhanced CLAS scheme has introduced a structured programme. Volunteers with limited or no criminal law experience will be guided through their initial cases by experienced senior criminal law practitioners. Volunteers will be designated as Assistant Counsel for at least their first 3 cases and assist the Lead Counsel in running their cases. Thereafter they may progress to handle "plead guilty" ("PG") cases and "claim trial" ("CT") cases with low maximum sentences. After gaining the necessary experience, they can handle more complex cases.

The primary goal of the training programme is to develop a general understanding of the criminal justice system's response to crime in society, with emphasis on the origins and purpose of criminal Courts, key terminology, and the role of defence counsel and the key stages of a criminal case. Each module is catered to provide an introductory survey of a particular aspect of the criminal justice process. Each module sees some 30 to 40 attendees and has attracted the interest of other organisations such as various embassies.

#### E. Volunteer Engagement

Under Enhanced CLAS, government funding comes with a target of 6,000 cases to be granted assistance (to be achieved over a 5-year period). This is a vast increase when compared to the average of about 400 cases aided a year previously. What is critical therefore is to get new volunteers on board the scheme, whilst actively encouraging existing volunteers to take on more cases. This is the most vital imperative for the CLAS Committee.

Whilst the payment of honoraria will go some way to achieve this, greater awareness is necessary amongst lawyers and the general public of the vital contributions CLAS volunteers make. Towards this end, CLAS has been featured in the following:-

- a. A TV show "The Verdict" featuring CLAS volunteers' good work. This was result of a close collaboration between Sharon Wong of EN Films Pte Ltd, on the one hand, and PBSO on the other, where PBSO provided case studies and profiles of actual cases handled by CLAS volunteers. Thirteen episodes were produced, featuring cases handled by some of our volunteers like Tan Hee Joek, Peter Ong and Mahesh Rai.
- b. CLAS has also been actively promoting a YouTube clip "Prisoners in Paradise" by CLAS volunteer Josephus Tan which portrays, inter alia, his CLAS cases, and the impact that such volunteerism has on the lives of individuals.
- Several of our volunteers, such as Tan Cheow Hung and Mervyn Cheong were also featured

- in articles in various publications including the Straits Times and Singapore Law Gazette.
- d. CLAS is also considering the acknowledgement and appreciation of CLAS volunteers. In August 2015, an appreciation lunch was organised with the Chief Justice, where certificates were signed and presented by the Chief Justice to the top volunteers of 2014. Another lunch is also planned with the Attorney-General.

#### F. Institute of Mental Health ("IMH")

IMH has volunteered to conduct a Talk Session between its doctors and Counsel, to further explain the process and aspects of procuring an IMH medical report. This is just another step in establishing a better working relationship between the two entities.

#### G. Community Justice Centre ("CJC")

The Community Justice Centre ("CJC") is an independent charity with IPC (Institute of Public Character) status conferred. Based in the State Courts, the CJC is committed to ensuring litigants in person ("LIPs") have access to justice through community partnership.

CJC is a one-stop hub that provides social welfare assistance and legal advice [through the Pro Bono Services Office's ("PBSO") Legal Clinics] to Litigants in Person ["LIP"] and their family members. Through the support of the CJC, the LIPs should be able to better present their case, follow proceedings and understand judicial rulings or pronouncements in their respective cases. The Law Society and CJC have signed a Memorandum of Understanding for the Law Society and in particular for PBSO to assist CJC with its efforts to aid the public. Since late last year, CLAS has been collaborating with CJC to assist CLAS applicants who require legal advice and social assistance for themselves and their families, to connect with CJC. Thus when an applicant is interviewed by our CLAS Officers, the Officer would also ascertain the financial, social and welfare condition of the applicant and family, and where appropriate, will refer the case to CJC with the applicant's consent. For applicants who are in remand, CLAS has modified its CLAS application

form so that remandees, besides applying for CLAS, may also request for civil legal advice and social assistance for their families.

CLAS is committed to carry on working with CJC to better provide assistance to our walk-in applicants.

The mission of the Law Awareness Committee (the "Committee") is to coordinate and implement activities to increase public awareness of the law.

2015 is a milestone year for us at the Committee.

Of the initiatives and programmes undertaken during the period 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, the marque event was the Law Awareness Week @ CDC in July 2015. We highlight some of them below, as well as various initiatives scheduled to take place in the 4th quarter of 2015:

#### 1. Law Awareness Week @ CDC

As a testament to the spirit of collaboration and access to justice, the 5 Community Development Councils ("CDCs") of Singapore teamed up with the Law Society of Singapore to host Law Awareness Week 2015 @ CDC ("LAW").

With the commitment of member volunteers and the pro bono clubs from the National University of Singapore and the Singapore Management University, we managed to achieve 2 firsts in LAW: (i) this was the first time that the Law Society worked with the CDCs to bring a series of law talks to the residents in the heartland estates across the 5 CDC districts, and (ii) this was the first time we rolled out a week-long suite of talks across our sunny island.

Held from 20 to 26 July 2015, 30 legal talks were scheduled to promote greater law awareness to the community, on various topics affecting the residents' everyday lives such as family issues, employment matters, consumer protection, advance planning and end of life issues.

#### 2. Know the Law Now 2015

Since 1998, the Law Society of Singapore has produced and circulated the Know the Law publication as part of the Society's ongoing efforts to raise awareness of the law among the general

public. It is intended to serve as an easy-to-use, basic introduction to the law in Singapore and an initial reference point on legal issues and where to seek legal help.

Know the Law Now 2015 was expanded and updated to include changes in legislations, as well as new laws recently introduced such as Protection from Harassment Act ("POHA").

To further enhance accessibility of legal information, we are looking at providing Mandarin, Malay and Tamil translations in due course.

#### 3. Project Schools Phase 2

Project Schools was launched in 2012 with the objective of engaging, enabling and empowering our youth to facilitate a greater awareness of the law, highlight their rights and obligations, and to inform them of the consequences of juvenile delinquency.

This continued throughout 2013 and 2014 and since its launch in July 2012, 35 schools have taken part in the programme, impacting over 15,000 students.

Project Schools Phase 2 will see the development of new content topics (sexual offences, property related offences and drugs and substance abuse) and an increased reach to impact 30% of all secondary schools in Singapore.

#### 4. Law Works

Law Works was launched in 2013, and the Law Society continued its partnership with NTUC in 2015 to bring awareness of the law to the workers and PMETs. For the period 1 September 2014 to

31 August 2015, a total of 4 legal primer talks took place.

We will continue to work with NTUC to produce 7 pocket series booklets touching on topics such as (1) My First Job; (2) Termination, Retrenchment and Retirement; (3) Maternity Benefits, Parental and Childcare Leave; (4) Workplace Bullying; (5) Workplace Injuries; (6) POHA; and (7) Workplace Discrimination by end of 2015.

#### 5. Law Cares/Golden Years

Law Cares focuses on the elderly and the legal issues that they and their caregivers face. Golden Years is an annual project under the Law Cares programme that the Law Society undertakes in partnership with the NUS and SMU law students.

This year, the Golden Years outreach was held in conjunction with LAW and 16 talks on end of life issues were held.

#### 6. Street Smart

The Street Smart initiative aims to bring legal awareness to the local and foreign commercial sex workers who may face stigmatization if they were to attend the more public legal talks and clinics.

Mobile outreach and roving clinics were held in areas such as Geylang, Changi Village, Rowell and Woodlands.

The Project Law Help Committee's ("PLH Committee") mission is to provide pro bono non-litigation commercial legal advice to charities, non-profit organisations, social enterprises and voluntary welfare organisations.

Examples of assistance rendered include: how to register a charity; compliance requirements; reviewing and drafting employment and other types of contracts; and intellectual property issues.

#### 1. Volunteers and Organisations Helped

c. As at 31 July 2015, we have 124 volunteers for both our COC initiative and PLH scheme.

### 2. Expansion to Include COC under PLH Assistance

When the COC initiative was introduced, it was part of a larger group of legal clinics administered by the Pro Bono Services Office ("PBSO") with oversight from the Law Awareness Committee.

However, as the aim of the COC is to provide legal guidance to charities, societies, voluntary welfare organisations ("VWOs"), not for profit organisations ("NPOs") and social enterprises ("SEs") as an organisation and not to its beneficiaries, the PLH Committee felt that it would be more appropriate for the COC to be included under PLH Assistance to enable the PLH Committee to have oversight of these legal clinics.

#### 3. Events Held

A networking event organised by the PLH Committee, working with sponsors Clifford Chance, was held on 13 March 2015 at the Art Plural Gallery, on Armenian Street, to bring together various VWOs, NPOs and volunteer law firms to give them an opportunity to meet and network. The PLH committee will find further ways to give VWOs and NPOs more opportunities to meet with volunteer firms going forward.

#### 4. Connections with Agencies

The PLH Committee continues to support collaborations with various agencies who work with VWOs and NPOs, including linkages with Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth ("MCCY"), National Council of Social Services ("NCSS") and the newly formed Singapore Centre for Social Enterprise ("raiSE"). The PLH Committee also assisted with participation in Ministry of Social and Family's ("MSF") ComCare Enterprise Fund ("CEF") panel to review and vet applications for funding for social enterprises, an initiative that has not merged with activities conducted under the banner of raiSE.

#### 5. Update and Re-print of legaleSE Toolkit

The 1st legaleSE toolkit focused primarily on SEs was launched on 7 December 2013 and all 1,000 copies have been fully distributed.

As PBSO is still receiving requests for copies of the toolkit, the PLH Committee felt that it was timely to review and update the content to include more information pertaining to charities, VWOs and societies, making this new handbook a "must have" for all NPOs and SEs in Singapore.

The chapters in the handbook have been updated and are currently in the final stages of review. The PLH Committee hopes to print 2,000 copies by the end of 2015 for distribution in 2016. The Committee is presently in discussion with raiSE on the possibility of launching this new handbook at one of their events scheduled for the rest of this year.

The Advocacy Committee (the "Committee") consists of 21 members, with a good mix of junior, middle and senior members of the profession. The main focus of the Committee is to provide advocacy training for members of the profession.

For many years, the primary work of the Committee has been the conduct of the Advocacy Workshops that form an essential component of the Part B course run by the Singapore Institute of Legal Education ("SILE"). This is a challenging task as it involves providing personalised advocacy coaching to trainee lawyers over a full day workshop on a Saturday with a further two-hour workshop on a Monday evening. Given the large cohort of trainee lawyers entering the profession, these workshops are conducted on most Saturdays from August right though to November each year. The Committee maintains a pool of over 80 advocacy trainers who are practising lawyers and judicial officers with at least 5 years of experience in active advocacy.

To ensure consistency and quality in the teaching of advocacy, the Committee conducts advocacy teacher training workshops for its trainers each year. This year, the Committee successfully conducted 2 teacher training workshops.

The first was an Advocacy Teachers' Refresher Course held on 4 July 2015 and involved a half day workshop where the advocacy trainers were trained in the methodology used by the Committee in the teaching of advocacy. This methodology was developed by the National Institute of Trial Advocacy ("NITA") in the United States and is now widely used in a number of jurisdictions as the de rigueur method of teaching advocacy. The workshop was conducted by our senior trainers, many of whom have been involved in the teaching of advocacy skills for more than 10 years.

The Committee also conducted an intensive Advocacy Teacher Training Course held from 10 to 11 July 2015 for new trainers inducted into the Advocacy Committee's pool of trainers. This course was conducted by our senior trainers who were assisted by senior advocacy trainers from the Australian Bar Association ("ABA"). In this regard, the Advocacy Committee would like to express its thanks to the ABA for their assistance and in sending Mr Ian Temby AO QC, Mr Paul Menzies QC, Dr Josh D Wilson QC and Mr Shane Gill - all of whom provided outstanding coaching to our trainers who attended the course.

The teaching expertise of our advocacy trainers is well sought after by the overseas legal community. This year, our senior trainers have been invited to teach advocacy at courses conducted in Malaysia by the Malaysian Bar, in the United States by NITA and in Australia by the ABA.

In order to ensure that our trainers are kept up to date on any developments in teaching methodology, a number of our senior trainers are sent each year to attend various advanced advocacy courses conducted in Australia and the United States.

As part of the Committee's continuing professional development effort, a specialist programme in Written Advocacy was developed by the Committee and launched in March 2015. Senior members of the Bar were invited as lecturers and tutors for the course. Materials were specially developed for the course, enabling participants to hone their written advocacy skills through small tutorial groups.

The Committee is in the midst of developing an Intermediate Advocacy Course, tentatively scheduled to be run over 3 days in December 2015. This course is designed to enhance the advocacy skills of practitioners who have between 4 to 7 years of litigation experience. The teaching faculty of this course will be drawn from the Committee's pool of senior trainers as well as leading silks and advocacy trainers from Commonwealth jurisdictions.

The Committee will continue to work with relevant stakeholders on programmes to enhance the advocacy skills of our practitioners and looks forward to the continuing support of senior members of the Bar for such programmes.

The Committee wishes to thank all trainers, the Judiciary and the Attorney-General's Chambers for their support of the advocacy programmes and looks forward to their continuing support in the year ahead.

The Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee (the "ADR Committee") is divided into 3 Sub-Committees focusing on different areas of alternative dispute resolutions, namely the Law Society Arbitration Scheme, Mediation and International Arbitration.

For the period 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, the ADR Committee has actively been involved in a variety of activities. The main activities are set out as follows:

# 1. Visit to the KL Regional Centre for Arbitration ("KLRCA") and Malaysian Bar Council ("MBC")

Representatives from the Committee attended the launch of the KLRCA in November 2014, and had a fruitful meeting with the Arbitration and Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee of the MBC.

#### 2. Seminars

The International Arbitration Sub-Committee ('IA Sub-Committee") organised a number of seminars/ workshops in the reporting year, a couple of which were held in collaboration with external partners, such as the Young International Arbitration Group (of the London Court of International Arbitration)

and the Young International Council for Commercial Arbitration in the first half of 2015. The topics covered included topical issues in international arbitration with discussions of Singapore case law, as well as management of cross cultural issues in international arbitration.

The IA Sub-Committee is in the midst of arranging for a seminar on "Basic Introduction to International Arbitration", in September 2015. The Sub-Committee will be engaging a well-known arbitrator and Queen's Counsel as speakers for this event. Apart from this seminar, the Sub-Committee is also working on holding an interactive workshop for practitioners looking to venture into the practice area of International Arbitration, tentatively to be held in the second half of 2015.

The ADR Committee is collaborating with the Intellectual Property Committee to hold a Seminar on "Arbitration and Intellectual Property Disputes – Arbitration or Litigation" on 31 August 2015.

The ADR Committee is also in the midst of arranging for a large-scale mediation event which will involve various organisations such as the Ministry of Manpower, IPOS, SIMC, SMC, Resolvers, MeD8, Harmony Mediation Group, Eagles Mediation & Counselling Centre, WIPO Arbitration and Mediation Centre, amongst others, which is planned to be held in first half of 2016.

### 3. Law Society Arbitration Scheme ("LSAS")

As an ongoing effort to promote the use of LSAS, the LSAS Sub-Committee has made contact with various organisations such as the Consumers Association of Singapore ("CASE"), Club Managers Association (Singapore), Singapore Business Federation ("SBF") and the Real Estate Developers' Association of Singapore ("REDAS") and had made presentations to these organisations and their members to gain awareness of the LSAS.

The approach to these bodies has proven successful. CASE will be entering into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Law Society to refer certain cases to be dealt with under the LSAS.

As the State Courts have worked with the ADR Committee on including LSAS as one of the ADR options in both the Primary Justice Project and the simplified process for MC Suits, the Committee is now exploring the possibility of collaborating with the High Court so that litigants may benefit from the use of the LSAS.

Apart from the above, the LSAS Sub-Committee is also looking into a possible partnership with SBF and SMC on the Fair Tenancy Framework.

Following the success of the tea session held for the LSAS Panel of Arbitrators, the Sub-Committee will be holding a lunch session in October 2015 for the Arbitrators, where the signing of the MOU with CASE would be the highlight of the session.

To date, there have been a total of 12 cases under the LSAS. The ADR Committee expects this to grow as greater awareness is raised of the LSAS.

#### 4. Networking in Mediation Sessions

The ADR Committee has been participating in these sessions where various mediation organisations gather once every quarter to share information on mediation. The ADR Committee hosted one of the sessions in April 2015 and received a large turn-out of attendees. Samuel Chacko and Eric Chew are the representatives at these sessions.

### 5. Mediation Scheme for the Law Society ("LSMS")

The Mediation Sub-Committee took on the task of considering the viability of establishing LSMS and will in due course make its proposal to Council. The proposal is currently in discussions stage.

#### 6. Consultations

The Committee has also provided valuable feedback on consultations relating to the Hague Convention of 30 June 2005 on choice of Court agreements, as well as the Draft Professional Conduct Rules 2015.

#### 7. Focus Group for the Judiciary Taskforce

Eric Chew is representing the ADR Committee to participate in the focus group to provide inputs on needs and concerns in relation to information technology.

During the reporting period, the Civil Practice Committee (the "Committee") made several notable contributions to the legal profession and the Civil Bar. The key contributions are set out below.

#### 1. Litigation Conference 2015

The Committee organised the Litigation Conference 2015 (the "Conference") which was held on 16 and 17 March 2015. This was the third of the series which was first started in 2013.

The theme for the Conference was International Commercial Litigation and leveraged on the muchanticipated launch of the Singapore International Commercial Court ("SICC") at the start of 2015. The first day of the Conference was devoted to issues dealing with SICC. Senior Minister of State Ms Indranee Rajah, SC delivered the Keynote Address on the first day during which the Minister made the significant announcement that Singapore would be signing the Hague Convention on the Choice of Court Agreements on 25 March 2015. The Conference further showcased members of the Judiciary and established legal practitioners who participated as speakers and panellists.

The Conference enjoyed a resounding success, with over 250 registrants consisting of both local and overseas delegates. The Conference provided one of the first platforms for the SICC to be discussed for which the Supreme Court expressed their appreciation. The overall feedback received showed that the Conference was well-received by participants.

#### 2. Dialogues and Engagements with the Courts

The Committee continues its involvement with the Supreme Court and State Courts in furthering the interests of the Civil Bar.

Following the Committee's involvement in the Supreme Courts' Costs Budgeting briefing in June 2014, the Committee organised a seminar on Costs Budgeting on 12 November 2014 with the then SAR Yeong Zee Kin and AR Una Khng.

The Committee was also consulted by the Supreme Court for its "Guide for the Conduct of Companies, Insolvency, Equity & Trust and Arbitration Suits" which was issued on 8 December 2014.

On 23 March 2015, the Committee engaged in a dialogue with the Supreme Court and took the opportunity to thank the then Registrar Foo Chee Hock for his support extended to the Civil Bar during his tenure. Following his appointment, the current Registrar Vincent Foong invited the Committee for an informal tea session at the Supreme Court. Registrar Foong encouraged the Committee to continue its active involvement with the Court.

The Committee has continued to use every opportunity it gets in its various dialogues and meetings to seek early consultation on initiatives affecting civil practice. In this regard, the Committee has requested that it be allowed to participate in the Civil Justice Commission that was announced by the Chief Justice at the Opening of the Legal Year.

The Committee engaged in dialogues with the State Courts on 9 December 2014 and 23 April 2015. The Courts have sought representation from the Committee in the Courts' working groups for various initiatives. For example, the Committee was involved in the working group relating to the Simplification of the MC Suit process. The Committee's representatives provided extensive feedback to the Courts which was incorporated in subsequent revisions. The Committee was involved in the Courts' briefing session to the Bar on 28 October 2014 prior to implementation on 1 November 2014.

The Committee was also involved in the State Courts' quarterly dialogue on 23 January 2015 and 22 April 2015.

#### 3. Consultations

The Committee continues to participate actively in public and private consultations, such as the Ministry of Law consultations on the Bankruptcy (Amendment) Bill 2015 and the Legal Profession (Professional Conduct) Rules 2015.

#### 4. Other Notable Initiatives

As part of its outreach efforts to members of the Civil Bar, the Committee is in the process of developing a feedback portal on the Law Society website to highlight the latest legal developments impacting the Civil Bar and to allow members to contribute their feedback.

The Committee has continued to use every opportunity it gets in its various dialogues and meetings to seek early consultation on initiatives affecting civil practice.

The Law Society's CPD programmes have continued to perform well this past year. Over 70 seminars, workshops and conferences were organised and supported by the Law Society from 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, which attracted more than 5,600 registrations from both members and non-members.

Phase 2 of the Mandatory CPD Scheme came into effect in January 2015. Practitioners with up to 15 years of practice experience are now required to fulfil mandatory CPD requirements. The increase in number of practitioners who require CPD points means that there is a need for the Society to increase the number of CPD activities. The CPD Committee, together with the various practice committees of the Society stepped up to the challenge by designing and developing more CPD activities for members throughout the reporting period.

#### Requests by Members for the Committee's Ruling, Direction or Guidance on Conveyancing Practice Issues

The Committee continues to assist members by providing, if possible, rulings/guidance on various conveyancing practice issues that are encountered by conveyancing practitioners.

#### 2. Day of Conveyancing Highlights

The Committee organised the "Day of Conveyancing Highlights 2014". This event was held on 7 November 2014 for the 3rd consecutive year. Speakers at this event included directors and managers from Singapore Land Authority, Inland Revenue Authority of Singapore and Housing and Development Board who shared views on issues relating to Government Land Sales, Goods and Services Tax and the steps to be taken in Sale & Purchase of HDB resale flats.

There were also several senior lawyers, established in their respective areas of practice, and representatives of insurers, who addressed various topics of concern to real estate practitioners. These topics included Legal Effect of Bankruptcy and Insolvency on Real Estate Transactions, compliance issues of the Personal Data Protection Act, as well as the legal pitfalls in conveyancing.

The Committee is now preparing for the "Day of Conveyancing Highlights 2015" scheduled to take place on 6 November 2015. The 2015 event will see more speakers discussing new topics of interest and relevance to conveyancing practitioners. Some of the confirmed speakers include representatives from the Personal Data Protection Commission, Singapore Management University, JTC Corporation and Lockton Companies Pte Ltd.



The Pamphlet will be available in police stations for persons who are arrested or brought in for questioning. The Law Society hopes to make it available in as many public locations as possible.

This Pamphlet is important and necessary because criminal lawyers recognise that information about legal rights during investigations may not be easy for members of the public to find or understand without the assistance of lawyers.

From September 2014 to August 2015, the Family Law Practice Committee (the "Committee") has been involved in the following activities:

## 1. Dialogues with the Family Justice Courts ("FJC")

The Committee continued to engage regular quarterly dialogue sessions with the FJC to provide feedback in relation to the issues such as the new Family Justice Act, Rules and Practice Directions.

#### 2. Family Law Practice Seminars

The Committee organised 2 seminars in March and May 2015. The first covered topics such as appeals, maintenance and personal protection orders, while the second touched on the International Child Abduction Act, practical perspectives on child abduction and relocation. The Committee is in the midst of planning 1 or 2 more seminars in the second half of the year.

Judge of Appeal Andrew Phang, as Chairman of the FLP Accreditation Committee, as well as Judicial Commissioner Valerie Thean and Judicial Commissioner Debbie Ong, attended the second town hall.

#### 4. Consultation

The Committee provided views on the consultation relating to the draft Professional Conduct Rules 2015.

#### 5. Legal Clinics

The Committee members continue to provide free

legal advice every Tuesday and Wednesday at legal clinics in the Family Justice Courts.

## 6. Tea Session with Students from the Faulty of Law, NUS

As a tradition which has been carried on for many years by the Committee, its members met with students from the Faulty of Law in April 2015 for a tea session to share their experiences as family law practitioners.

## 7. Interview in Singapore Law Gazette ("SLG")

The Co-Chairpersons gave an interview in the June 2015 issue of the SLG, addressing questions relating to the development of family law practice in the FIC.

The Information Technology Committee (the "Committee") continued its work in the following areas:

- Collecting and providing feedback to the Courts on the use of IT by the Courts; and
- 2. Conducting talks and sessions for members on the use of IT by a law practice.

#### **Feedback to the Courts**

The Judiciary, together with the IDA, has formed a *Courts of the Future* taskforce to identify the future IT needs of the Judiciary. Some members of the Committee, as well as representatives of other committees and practice groups have been invited to participate in focus groups discussions scheduled to be held in in the last quarter of 2015. The discussions in these focus group sessions will help chart and design the IT Roadmap for the Courts of the future.

### Talks for Practitioners on the Use of IT by Law Firms

On 16 September 2014, the Committee, together with the Small Law Firms Committee, conducted a seminar entitled "Government Grants – Making the Most of this Gift Horse" to provide information to members on the grants and credit schemes that are available to help defray the cost of IT acquisitions.

The Committee has also supported the Small Law Firms and State Courts Committees by sharing information and experiences on IT use by a lawyer. Information shared included using cloud storage solutions, free or affordable software and applications that a practitioner might use (eg for document management, remote access to office computers, CRM etc), using technology during hearings and data protection issues arising from the use of IT.

## Hosting Delegates from the Japanese Federation of Bar Associations

On 10 April 2015, members of the IT Committee of the Japanese Federation of Bar Associates visited the Law Society as part of their research and study into e-Litigation and e-Case Management systems that may be used in various countries. The Committee gave the delegates a demonstration of the e-Litigation portal. Bryan Ghows also conducted a demonstration on the Magnum system used by the litigants and Courts in *Global Yellow Pages Ltd v Promedia Directories Pte Ltd.*

#### 1. National Insolvency Conference

Following the success of the inaugural Regional Insolvency Conference in 2014, the Committee will be organising a national conference which seeks to bring together practitioners involved in various aspects of insolvency works, namely the lawyers, accountants, bankers and regulators. The Conference creates a platform for practitioners to share and discuss current trends and developments impacting international and regional insolvency law. The topics for discussion include restructuring in the shipping industry and challenges and options available to foreign creditors and/or shareholders when foreign companies become insolvent or approach insolvency.

The conference will feature a line-up of distinguished panellists and speakers including leading legal, accounting and financial practitioners with judges/former judges from around the region. Minister for Foreign Affairs and Minister for Law, Mr K Shanmugam will be delivering the keynote. The welcoming address and closing address will be delivered by Chairperson, Sushil Nair and the Chairman of the organising committee, Andrew Chan respectively.

#### 2. Consultation

The Committee participated in the public consultation on Bankruptcy (Amendment) Bill by the Ministry of Law and continues to communicate the concerns and views of the Committee on insolvency matters to external stakeholders.

#### 3. Representative on IPAS

The Intellectual Property Practice Committee (the "Committee") was engaged in the following activities during the reporting period from 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015.

#### 1. Consultations

The Committee was consulted and actively involved in a number of important consultations, including the following:

- Public consultation by IPOS on Proposed Changes to Singapore's IP laws to allow for Enhanced Border Measures in relation to IPinfringing Goods and the Right of Remuneration for the Broadcast, Playing or Performing of Sound Recordings in Public;
- Consultation by IPOS on the IPOS Registry Of Designs Guidelines On Graphical User Interfaces;
- Review of the Trade Mark Dispute Resolutions Regime by IPOS in relation to the Circulars on Evidentiary Issues and Full Hearings; and
- Industry consultation by the Ministry of Law of the draft bill for the Legal Profession (Professional Conduct) Rules 2015.

# 2. Seminar on Intellectual Property Disputes - Arbitration or Litigation

The Committee and the Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee collaborated to organise a seminar titled "Intellectual Property Disputes – Arbitration or Litigation" on 31 August 2015. The seminar aimed to provide a better understanding of common issues in IP disputes; the benefits and limitations of resolving IP disputes through arbitration; the relative duration and costs of arbitration and litigation; as well as insights into why Singapore offers an appropriate seat for the resolution of IP disputes.

#### 3. Law Society Annual CPD Day - IP Session

The Committee conducted an IP session during the Law Society's CPD Day on 20 November 2014 which covered topics such as privacy in the digital age and discussions on the World Sport Group case and the St Regis case.

#### 4. Dialogues

The Committee engaged in regular dialogues with the Courts and IPOS, with the aim of contributing towards the development of the legal regime and practice of intellectual property in Singapore. The Committee also organised a tea session for the IPOS trademarks examiners and patent examiners on 19 May 2015.

The Committee was invited by the Ministry of Law and IPOS in February 2015 to appoint a representative to the review committee for Singapore's Intellectual Property Dispute Resolution Framework which involves enhancing the existing framework by taking into consideration international developments, standards and practices and making recommendations on improving accessibility for individuals and SMEs.

The Committee engaged in regular dialogues with the Courts and IPOS, with the aim of contributing towards the development of the legal regime and practice of intellectual property in Singapore.

Between the period 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, the Muslim Law Practice Committee (the "Committee") was active in the following initiatives:

#### 1. Seminars

The Committee organised a seminar in January 2015 on the topic of "Arbitration in Islamic Finance". Zhulkarnain from the Committee and Mr Faizal Ahmad Manjoo (a Shariah scholar, solicitor, and an academic specialising in Islamic law and Finance) presented at this seminar.

As a continuity from 2014, the Committee also held a seminar on "Introduction to Muslim Inheritance Law" in June 2015, in collaboration with the Probate Practice and Succession Planning Committee. The Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Halijah Binte Mohamad presented on the topic "Overview on Muslim Inheritance & Succession Laws and Practical Aspects of Muslim Inheritance".

## 2. Feedback on Administration of Muslim Law Act ("AMLA")

The Committee reviewed the AMLA and proposed amendments which, upon Council's approval, were sent to the Minister for Communications and Information & Minister-in-Charge of Muslim Affairs, Associate Professor Dr Yacoob Ibrahim, the Syariah Court, Majlis Ugama Islam Singapura and the Registry of Muslim Marriages.

# 3. Monthly Pre-Divorce Briefings at Syariah Court ("Projek Iltizam")

Members of the Committee, together with other practitioners, continue to volunteer at the Syariah Court's monthly pre-divorce briefings held on the last Saturday of each month. These volunteers explain divorce processes and proceedings to the participants, focusing mainly on the forms and details to be completed.

# 4. Singapore Council of Women's Organisations ("SCWO") Monthly Legal Clinics

Members of the Committee, along with other practitioners from the Bar, continue to volunteer and assist in giving legal advice to members of the public at the SCWO's legal clinics every month.

# 5. Proposed Family Law Practitioner Accreditation Scheme ("FLP Accreditation Scheme")

The Committee provided feedback on the proposed FLP Accreditation Scheme, in particular the proposed method of assessment for draft syllabus on Muslim Family Law.

#### 6. Dialogues with the Syariah Court

The Committee continues its current practice of engaging in regular dialogues with the Syariah Court, with the main objective of improving the practice of Muslim law in Singapore.

The PIPD Committee has had a busy year.

Considerable time and effort was spent on looking into a Law Society Arbitration Scheme ("LSAS") for NIMA claims as an alternative to the present FIDREC Scheme (which applies to PPD claims worth \$3,000/- and below). This is to facilitate clients who are unable to represent themselves at FIDREC proceedings. Thus far, the PIPD Committee has consulted with the Alternative Dispute Resolution ("ADR") Committee and has decided to utilise the existing LSAS Scheme with modifications. Further, LSAS is already mentioned in the State Courts' FIDREC Protocol. At the time of writing the decision is to proceed with a feasibility study for the scheme, by doing a survey amongst practitioners, mainly on the issue of whether a critical mass of mediators and arbitrators with proper training can be built and whether the practitioners and their clients will bring their cases. The Committee will also continue consultations with the ADR Committee.

The PIPD Committee consulted with the Supreme Court and the Singapore Mediation Centre ("SMC") on setting up the Formal Neutral Evaluation Scheme for large-value personal injury claims, so as to promote fair resolution and savings of legal costs for all. A survey has been conducted by the SMC and the decision is to proceed with a pilot scheme.

The PIPD Committee has given guidance on queries from members of the Bar. In one query, the Committee rejected the idea of the Law Society providing guidance for the charging of solicitor and client costs ("SNC") for personal injury claims arising from industrial accidents. The Committee was of the view that the Law Society could not intervene due to anti-competition laws. In another query, the Committee also rejected the introduction of executive oversight on SNC costs, similar to Road

Traffic claims. This was a matter for Parliament. The member also did not provide any evidence of foreign or local workers being over-charged. Therefore, the Committee saw no reason to recommend a study into the need for such intervention.

Two Committee members participated in discussions between members of the Council of the Law Society (the "Council") and certain NGOs concerning alleged over-charging of foreign workers by law firms, as well as other concerns surfaced by the NGOs. Both members agreed with the views of the Council that the NGOs and the foreign workers should file a complaint with the Law Society if there was any credible evidence of misconduct, rather than generally airing their concerns over the press.

The PIPD Committee consulted with the General Insurance Association ("GIA") Motor Insurance Bureau Committee with respect to certain practices of the Bureau in rejecting claims for accidents caused or contributed by an unknown motorist.

The PIPD Committee consulted with the Public Trustee's office (the "PT") regarding agreement on SNC costs for cases that fell within the PT's jurisdiction. It was the view of the Committee that where lawyers sought an enhancement of SNC costs, the PT often asked questions more relevant to the quantification of PNP costs. The PT and the Committee are thus working on a template application form to guide both the sender (law firms) and receiver (PT) in order for both sides to properly address questions of SNC costs.

During meetings with the GIA Motor Committee, the PIPD Committee also received feedback concerning a possible need for a NIMA (Non-injury Motor Accident) Protocol to better facilitate prerepair inspections and enhance their usefulness in preserving the evidence. The said Protocol is efficacious on the point but certain practices on the ground are said to be obstructing the smooth preservation of the evidence. This matter is still under review.

The Committee is also reviewing the need for revisions to the costs of renting an alternative vehicle when one's car is at the workshop.

The Committee has studied the contingency fee proposal and expressed its views to the Council insofar as the PIPD practice is concerned.

The Committee has discussed the new Supreme Court Costs Guidelines insofar as PIPD work is concerned. The Committee has recommended that the Council represent the interests of the PIPD Bar in expressing the view that the figures stated therein are on the low side.

Two Committee members participated in discussions with the Supreme Court, the State Courts, Attorney-General's Chambers, Ministry of Law, GIA and other stakeholders concerning possible law reform for road traffic claims.

With a view to closely align with the actual scope of work undertaken by the Committee, which includes matters relating to probate and administration as well as succession planning, the Probate Practice Committee was renamed the Probate Practice and Succession Planning Committee (the "Committee") in September 2014.

For the period September 2014 to August 2015, the Committee was actively participating in the following activities:

#### 1. Series of Probate Seminars

As a continued effort from 2014, the Committee organised a series of Probate Seminars in May and June 2015 in collaboration with the Muslim Law Practice Committee, which included topics such as Drafting of Wills, Essentials for Filing Applications, Contentious Probate Matters and Islamic Inheritance.

Apart from the participation of the Committee members, the Committee had the honour of having District Judges Ms Miranda Yeo and Ms Regina Ow from the Family Justice Courts ("FJC") address the topic "Essentials for Filing Applications". The Committee wishes to express its gratitude to these two officers. All the seminars were well-attended.

### 2. Quarterly Dialogues with Family Justice Courts

Since probate proceedings were moved to the FJC from January 2015, the Committee now engages in quarterly dialogues with the FJC on matters relating to Rules and Practice Directions with regard to civil proceedings under the Probate and Administration Act, as well as probate, succession, wills and related matters.

#### 3. Consultation

The Committee provided feedback to the Ministry of Law on the draft Professional Conduct Rules 2015.

# 4. Representation on External Committees

Dr Raman represents the Committee on the Lasting Power of Attorney Certificate Issuers Review Committee and the Lasting Framework Review Committee, set up by the Ministry of Social and Family Development.

#### 5. Representation on Proposed Professional Deputy Scheme Working Group

Goh Kok Yeow, Kee Lay Lian and Alice Tan-Goh represent the Committee on the Working Group in relation to the proposed Professional Deputyship Scheme, together with representatives from the Ministry of Social and Family Development, the Office of Public Guardian, Law Society's Pro Bono Services Office and the Agency for Integrated Care.


The Publications Committee (the "Committee") is charged with overseeing the following publications and projects of the Law Society:

#### 1. Singapore Law Gazette

The Committee publishes the official monthly magazine of the Law Society, the Singapore Law Gazette, which is available both online and in print. The Committee not only assists in the commissioning, writing and proof-reading of each issue but also curates special thematic issues and comes up with the cover design and tagline for each issue. In the reporting period, we published a themed issue on arbitration in October 2014. A special commemorative issue in August 2015 was produced to mark Singapore's Golden Jubilee as well as to pay tribute to the late Mr Lee Kuan Yew, who was an Honorary Member of the Law Society.

#### 2. Law Gazette Awards

The Singapore Law Gazette Awards were introduced in 2013 to recognise our writers for their contributions to the Singapore Law Gazette, and to encourage the writing of good quality articles. We awarded two prizes last year for the best feature articles, including an award for the best feature by a young lawyer. We also published a shortlist of 5 articles that the Committee felt deserved special mention. The Committee, at the




August 2015 Issue of the Law Gazette

#### 7. Annual Report

This year's Annual Report set in sepia monochrome tones, features the old courthouses of Singapore through the decades. The Committee felt a look back at our old courthouses would be a fitting theme to complement the celebration of SG50.

#### 8. eJus News

The Committee continues to oversee the weekly e-bulletin, eJus News, which brings the latest and most current practice information, news and related matters to the attention of members.

#### 9. Firm Closure Dissemination Service

The Committee continues to provide a service to assist law practices to disseminate notice of holiday/office closures to third party organisations (such as the Courts and government ministries) for a small fee. The service was introduced in January 2013 and has been well received by law practices.

# 10. Preparing for the Law Society's 50th Anniversary Publication

The Society will commemorate its 50th anniversary in 2017 and the Committee has started preparations for the publication by securing sufficient funding for the project, archiving old photographs and organising a sub-committee to work on the project.

This year, the Committee again divided up its work with each component looked after by a sub-committee so that every member has an opportunity to contribute to the thought leadership and creative process behind our publications. I am happy to report that this has resulted in the Committee having met each and every Workplan target for the period of reporting.

The Public and International Law Committee (the "Committee") was established to promote the study and understanding of public law and international law, and to develop awareness and an understanding of the extent of the application of public international law in Singapore.

The Committee organises events to promote and develop an awareness of public law and international law amongst lawyers, the various stakeholders connected to legal services and members of the public.

In previous years, the Committee organised public lectures, seminars and workshops in relation to public law (both constitutional and administrative) and international law (both public and private, including international arbitration).

The Committee organised a seminar on 30 October 2014 on "How International Tribunals Work in Practice". The seminar focused on the International Court of Justice with examples of Singapore's experience in litigating the Pedra Branca case before the Court, the recent judgment in the Cambodia-Thailand Temple of Preah Vihear case and the Indonesia-Malaysia case concerning the islands of Sipadan and Ligitan. The speakers were Professor S. Jayakumar and Mr Rodman Bundy.

This year, the Committee organised the "Administrative & Constitutional Law Conference 2015". The Conference was held on 27 February 2015 and covered the following topics:

- Regulation of Discretionary Powers of State Agencies
- Law and Practice of Administrative Law in Singapore: Arbitrating between the State and the Citizen
- Developments in Constitutional Law in Singapore

There were speakers from the National University of Singapore and Singapore Management University, as well as from overseas, including from Hong Kong, Malaysia and Australia.

For the reporting period of 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, the Small Law Firms Committee (the "Committee") has continued its collaboration with the State Courts Committee to host a series of luncheons at the State Courts Bar Room. This series was initiated in 2014 and has been received favourably by members who practise in the State Courts. Members were updated on legal practice and practice management matters by volunteer speakers or Secretariat staff. The luncheon sessions were held on 14 January 2015, 13 March 2015, 13 May 2015 and 22 July 2015 and the next two sessions have been scheduled for 18 September 2015 and 18 November 2015.

The Committee, with the assistance of the Continuing Professional Development Department, organised a special intake of the Singapore Mediation Centre course on "Mediation: Strategic Conflict Management for Professionals" at a discounted rate for the benefit of small law firm practitioners. The course was conducted at the Law Society's premises on 13 to 14 July 2015 and 3 to 5 August 2015.

The Committee collaborated with the Personal Data Protection Commission to launch the Law Society Personal Data Protection Act ("PDPA") Legal Advice Scheme (the "Scheme") on 1 June 2015. The Committee's Working Group members Lisa Sam, Michael S. Chia and Tan Jee Ming worked with the Secretariat to develop the Scheme. Under the Scheme, basic legal advice on PDPA compliance would be provided to Small and Medium-Sized Enterprises ("SMEs") during a one-hour consultation with a practitioner from the Scheme's panel.

The Committee participated in consultations, such as that relating to the draft Legal Profession (Professional Conduct) Rules.



In the year under review, the Solicitors' Accounts Rules Committee (the "Committee") received several queries on various issues arising from the Legal Profession (Solicitors' Accounts) Rules ("SA Rules"). Some of these are highlighted below:

 A member wanted to know if monies that were being collected as rental on an on-going basis and which are the subject of a litigation matter could be held by the lawyers for the parties involved in the litigation in a joint account and held in that joint account pending the outcome of the litigation proceedings.

The Committee replied to the member stating that Rule 9 (1)(c) of the SA Rules permits client's money to be paid into a separate bank account in the name of the client or of some person designated by the client provided that such an agreement is made in writing. The Committee cautioned, however, that he should ensure that the agreement is made in writing and the client is duly advised that such a separate bank account will not be covered by the regulatory regime under the SA Rules which has strict requirements on the management of money paid into a client account and also will not be covered by the audit requirements for money

In view of the latter, the member was requested to assess if, as a matter of prudence, the client should be advised of the option of seeking independent legal advice on the matter.

2. A law firm asked if their accounting records which are required under Rule 11(6) of the SA Rules to be kept for 6 years, may be kept in digital format, i.e. by scanning the paper records and storing the same in PDF or JPEG or other format in a computer disk, thereby replacing the paper records.

The Committee decided that having regard to Rule 11(5) of the SA Rules which allows for a computerised system of book-keeping so long as the book-keeping records are stored in printable form, the accounting records may be kept in a digital form so long as the contents can be printed out. The Committee highlighted to the member that reference should also be made to the provisions of the Evidence Act and other rules of evidence relating to the issue of general admissibility and proof of such electronic copies being true copies of the hard copy books.

- 3. Another member had a dispute over fees and wanted to know what he should do if a bill was issued and there was an objection by the client to the bill being paid by set off against a deposit. The Committee replied that in view of the objection from the client, the money would have to remain in the client account pending resolution of the client's objection.
- 4. A law corporation was faced with a situation where client money belonging to 5 former clients was to remain in their client account even though the law corporation was no longer acting for these former clients. This was because the lawyer-in-charge and former director intended to start his own law practice and obtain exemption from providing an accountant's report as he did not intend to hold client monies. The former clients had consented to the arrangement.

The Committee was of the view that subject to

ensuring that proper mandates were obtained from the former clients for the arrangement and compliance with the Legal Profession (Deposit Interest) Rules by the law corporation, the arrangement did not contravene the SA Rules. While the relevant matters may be transferred to the outgoing director, the former clients would remain the "clients" of the law corporation under the SA Rules for the purpose of ensuring that the monies are held in accordance with the SA Rules.

Besides answering queries, the Committee was also engaged in the following activities:

- A representative from the Committee participated as a panel speaker in the annual Mandatory Book-Keeper's course organised by the Law Society.
- 2. The Committee completed the update of the Law Society's Guide to the SA Rules (the "Guide") which was launched in May this year. The Guide is available to members at http://www.lawsociety.org.sg/forMembers/ResourceCentre/EShop/Store.aspx. The Committee has also compiled a list of guidance on queries provided to members which is available on the Society's website under "Guidance on Professional & Practice Issues" http://www.lawsociety.org.sg/forMembers/ResourceCentre/MembershipBenefits/GuidanceonProfessionalPracticeIssues.aspx. This will be updated progressively.
- 3. The Committee further provided its views to Council on a proposal to amend Rule 2(2) of the Legal Profession (Deposit Interest) Rules. Council has adopted the recommendations and has made representations for the amendment.



This report is in respect of the period 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015.

#### **Admission of Advocates and Solicitors**

A total of 662 applicants were admitted as advocates and solicitors of the Supreme Court of Singapore compared to 538 applicants who were admitted during the last reporting period. For the Mass Call held on 22 August 2015, 535 applicants were admitted. This is an increase from the 430 applicants admitted in the 23 August 2014 Mass Call.

#### **Part-Call Applications**

There were 47 applications for part-call for this reporting period, compared to 16 applications during the last reporting period. Out of the 47 applications, 44 were allowed and 3 were dismissed by the High Court. The dismissal was due to:

- (a) the practice trainee not having completed Part B of the Singapore Bar Examinations and not having an equivalent level of knowledge and training in 1 application; and
- (b) the applications not being made by the practice trainees' supervising solicitor in the other 2 applications.

#### Section 15(1) Legal Profession Act - Ad hoc Admissions of Queen's Counsel

In the present reporting period, the Committee has considered 1 application for the ad hoc admission of Queen's Counsel ("QC") under the provisions of section 15(1) of the Legal Profession Act. The application was for the ad hoc admission of Heather Rogers, QC (OS No. 532/2015), which was heard by Justice Steven Chong and dismissed on 11 June 2015.

#### Section 78(1) Legal Profession Act -Applications for Employment of Support Staff

In the present reporting period, the Committee has considered 2 applications made by law practices for consent of the High Court to employ support staff in view of their bankruptcy or suspension from practice, as required under the provisions of section 78(1) of the Legal Profession Act.

In 1 of the applications, the prospective employee made a complaint against her former employer to the Society. Due to the complaint and the allegations that have been made and responded to by the former employer, Judicial Commissioner Chua Lee Ming dismissed the application.

The other application was granted by the High Court with conditions and/or undertakings imposed on the applicant.

Kenneth Goh Daniel Tan The Anti-Money Laundering Committee (the "Committee") assists Council of the Law Society in the consultations with the Ministry of Law on issues concerning the anti-money laundering ("AML") and counter terrorist financing ("CFT") requirements applicable to the legal profession.

The Committee also provides guidance to members on the AML/CFT practice rules. To develop awareness and understanding of the AML/CFT requirements amongst members, the Committee organises seminars.

2015 has been a busy year for the Committee, preparing and responding to new AML/CFT legislation. Part VA of the Legal Profession Act and the Legal Profession (Prevention of Money Laundering and Financing of Terrorism) Rules came into effect in May 2015. Prior to the legislation taking effect, the Committee gathered input from members on the draft Rules, and after the Rules came into effect in May 2015, the Committee followed up to generate awareness of the new legislative framework. In July 2015, an article



Circular on the Society's Practice Direction on the Prevention of Money Laundering and Financing of Terrorism 2015 was published in the Singapore Law Gazette; new Practice Directions on the prevention of money laundering and financing of terrorism were drafted and approved by Council; and an AML/CFT seminar was held for members. Further seminars are scheduled for August and November 2015.

Apart from raising awareness, the Committee also plays an integral role in the inspection of law practices. Council of the Law Society ("Council") is empowered to conduct inspections of law practices

in accordance with rule 26 of the Legal Profession (Prevention of Money Laundering and Financing of Terrorism) Rules to ascertain whether the AML/CFT rules are being complied with. The Committee oversees such inspections and advises Council on any issues or queries arising from the inspections.

The Committee will also be involved in interviews with the Financial Action Task Force as part of its inspection process involving the legal sector, in November 2015.

For the period 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, the Ethics Committee (the "Committee") received and responded to 2 formal requests from practitioners and assisted the Inquiry Panel, the Muslim Law Practice Committee and the Compliance department with queries on a wide range of professional ethics issues under the Legal Profession Act, the Legal Profession (Professional Conduct) Rules ("PCR") and the Legal Profession (Publicity) Rules ("Publicity Rules").

Members of the Committee were involved in various continuing professional development courses including the "Ethics in Practice & Legal Profession (Solicitors' Accounts) Rules for Practice Trainees" and the 3rd "Mandatory Ethics Programme for Newly Qualified Lawyers". Volunteers from the Committee also spoke on professional ethics for the 17th "Legal Practice Management Course" which was held in February 2015.

To keep members updated on ethics issues, the Committee published the following articles in the *Singapore Law Gazette*:

- March 2015: "Commentaries on the Law Society of Singapore's Practice Circular on the Supervision of Paralegals"; and
- August 2015: "You are a Witness, Counsel".

As a new initiative, the Committee decided to set up an Ethics Portal on the Law Society's website this year. In order to facilitate members' access to Law Society's Practice Directions and Guidance Notes, the Committee decided to topically categorise and host all the Practice Directions and Guidance Notes on the Law Society's website as an open access resource without the need to enter login details.

The Committee also actively participated in the Ministry of Law's Consultation on the draft Legal Profession (Professional Conduct) Rules.

### **Inquiries into Inadequate Professional Services**

This report covers complaints of inadequate professional services against lawyers that were referred to the Council of the Law Society (the "Council") from 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015 under section 75B of the Legal Profession Act (the "Act"). For the relevant period under consideration, 66 complaints were received. Out of the 66 complaints received, 4 complaints were rejected on account that that they did not refer to matters which form the ambit of inquiry under section 75B of the Act. In fact, 3 of the complaints referred to matters of alleged misconduct which is dealt with by way of a complaint under section 85(1) of the Act whilst the remaining complaint was against a Patent Agent who is not an advocate and solicitor. Seven complaints were closed on account of the parties being able to directly resolve the dispute between themselves. This is a twofold increase from the previous years' figure of 2 complaints having achieved that outcome. Another 3 complaints were closed as the complainants reverted that a complaint under section 75B of the Act will not result in the relief sought by them, being variation of Court Orders, review of the settlement amount or reduction in the bill amongst others. As for the remaining complaints, 5 have been stayed as the Complainant(s) have made another complaint under section 85(1) of the Act and current protocol dictates that Council will only make its determination on their complaint under section 75B of the Act when the inquiry into their complaint under section 85(1) of the Act has been concluded.

Save for a total of 10 complaints that had been referred for Council's deliberation, the remaining

complainants have yet to revert with better details and particulars and/or identify the breach of standards of adequate professional services which form the heads of their respective complaints. Further, some complainants have taken a complaint under section 75B to be akin to a general complaint over service quality standards made to a service provider often citing that certain demands and expectations be met. Accordingly, these complainants have been advised of the intent and purpose of a complaint under section 75B of the Act. As it stands, Council is unable to make any determination as to whether there is a prima facie cause of a breach of the standards of inadequate professional services when such requisite details are scant or lacking. Amongst these complaints, 20% arose primarily from disputes over solicitorclient costs and these complainants have been duly advised of their recourse through taxation or through mediation by way of the Law Society's Cost Dispute Resolve Scheme or the Singapore Mediation Centre's Small Case Commercial Mediation Scheme. Of note is the increase of around 8% of complaints in relation to the practice area of Personal Injury Motor Accident Claims whereby the complainants have indicated their unhappiness over significant deduction for solicitor-client costs visà-vis the settlement sum and/or their unhappiness over the settlement quantum. Seven complaints that had been referred for Council's determination have been dismissed as they did not reveal any prima facie case of a breach of the standards of adequate professional services or that the lawyers complained of had provided professional services of a quality reasonably expected of an advocate and solicitor.


# Mediations Conducted from 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015

For the relevant period, 3 mediations were conducted on account of the complainants opting for mediation to resolve their issues with the respondent solicitors. These matters were successfully resolved between the parties with the terms of settlement fully met by the respondent solicitor.

# Investigative Tribunals Appointed from 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015

Of the 12 complaints investigated by the respective Investigative Tribunals during the period under consideration (appointed in the previous period under consideration):-

- Three complaints were withdrawn mutually by the parties as they managed to resolve their dispute prior to the Investigative Tribunals making any determination on the matter;
- Two complaints resulted in the Investigative Tribunals concerned ordering compensation and/or result which directions were complied with; and
- Seven complaints were dismissed as the Investigative Tribunals concerned were unable to make any findings of inadequate professional services in relation to the standards complained of after hearing the submissions of the respondent solicitor.

# ACTIVE REVIEW COMMITTEES BETWEEN 1 SEPTEMBER 2014 TO 31 AUGUST 2015

As at 1 September 2014, there were 6 cases pending from the previous review year and 86 Review Committees were appointed for each case referred during this review year. The Review Committee either directs dismissal of a complaint with reasons or refers the same to the Chairperson of the Inquiry Panel for further investigation.

Out of a total of 92 cases, the results are as follows:

- 26 cases were dismissed completely;
- 47 cases were fully recommended for further investigation by an Inquiry Committee;
- 9 cases contained both a direction for dismissal for some complaints and a recommendation for further investigation for the rest by an Inquiry Committee; and
- 10 cases are still pending as at 31 August 2015.


# ACTIVE INQUIRY COMMITTEES BETWEEN 1 SEPTEMBER 2014 TO 31 AUGUST 2015

As at 1 September 2014, there were 19 cases pending from the previous review year. To date, 53 Inquiry Committees have been constituted to look into the complaints which have been referred by the Review Committees during this review year. 55 Inquiry Committees have completed their investigations and the results are as follows:

- 29 cases were dismissed;
- 9 cases were recommended for warnings, reprimand or imposition of penalties;
- 11 cases were referred for formal investigations by the Disciplinary Tribunal;
- 1 case was withdrawn by the Complainant; and
- 5 cases where the Inquiry Committees had recommended partial dismissals. As such, parts of these cases were either recommended for warnings, reprimand or imposition of penalties on the Respondents, or to be referred to the Disciplinary Tribunal.

Extensions of time were granted in several cases because of the unavailability of either the Complainant or the Respondent and the difficulty in fixing dates suitable to all parties. In some cases, extensions were granted due to the complexity of the cases. 17 cases are pending as at 31 August 2015.

Finally, I would like to thank all members of the Inquiry Panel for their valuable time and hard work put into handling the cases assigned to them. It is the willingness of members to take on these duties that ensures the integrity of the practising profession and upholds its independence.

The Council administers the discretionary Compensation Fund (the "Fund") that can make grants to reduce or mitigate loss suffered by any person in consequence of dishonesty of a lawyer in connection with his/her practice in Singapore or any trust in Singapore of which the lawyer is a trustee. Such grants may also be made to compensate for loss as a result of the dishonesty of an employee of a law practice in the course of his/her employment. The Fund is administered under the terms of section 75 of the Legal Profession Act and the Legal Profession (Compensation Fund) Rules.

Every practising member of the Law Society contributes an annual sum of \$100 per year to the Fund when he/she renews his/her full-time Practising Certificate. Those applying for Practising Certificates after 1 October contribute a sum of \$50 to the Fund.

Three pending applications arising from the dishonesty of Zulkifli Bin Amin reported earlier remained pending as the claimants have yet to provide particulars of information requested to support these applications.

One application arising from the dishonesty of Mustaffa Bin Abu Bakar which was reported last year is still pending information to be provided by the applicant.

For the period under review from 1 September 2014 to 31 August 2015, the Committee received one fresh application for a claim to the Compensation Fund. The application was rejected as the alleged loss did not arise from any dishonesty.

The Law Society's Compulsory Professional Indemnity Scheme (the "Scheme") has been renewed for a period of 12 months commencing 1 April 2015 with a 12.5% decrease in the Standard Primary Premium for the Limit of Indemnity of \$\$1,000,000 each claim inclusive of costs and expenses.

This is a significant achievement considering the fact that the Scheme's claims experience has not been favourable. At the point of negotiation, the average loss ratio for the last 5 complete years (2009 to 2013) increased from 64% in 2013 to 74% in 2014. For the Policy Year 2011/2012, the amount paid for claims exceeded \$\$8million. There were still pending claims with net reserves of about \$\$5.5million. The loss ratio for this particular year alone was more than 180%. Such a claims experience would typically result in a sizeable premium increase. In fact, purely based on the Scheme's loss ratio for the said 5 years, there would have been an increase of about 7% in the Standard Primary Premium for 2015/2016.

The Professional Indemnity ("PI") Committee, however, instructed the Scheme Broker, Lockton Companies (Singapore) Pte Ltd, to negotiate competitive renewal terms.

Despite the odds presented by the Scheme's claims history, with the aggressive negotiations by the Scheme's Broker and goodwill of the PI Committee with the Scheme insurers, a reduction of 12.5% in the Standard Primary Premium, which is substantial, was achieved.

The PI Committee further explored options including Cyber Liability insurance and Self-insurance schemes as well as handling queries and concerns of members on the Scheme coverage.

To familiarize members with the terms of the Scheme policy and guide members on what to do when an allegation of negligence is made, the Chairperson conducted a talk for members at the State Courts on 13 May 2015.

Despite the odds presented by the Scheme's claims history, with the aggressive negotiations by the Scheme's Broker and goodwill of the PI Committee with the Scheme insurers, a reduction of 12.5% in the Standard Primary Premium, which is substantial, was achieved.



### Report on the Financial Statements

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the financial year ended 31 March 2015

These notes form an integral part of and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying financial statements.

### 1 Summary of significant accounting policies

### (a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements, expressed in Singapore dollars, which is the Society's functional currency, have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Legal Profession Act (Chapter 161) and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS"). The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with FRS requires the use of estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of income and expenditure during the financial year. These estimates and assumptions are assessed on an on-going basis and are based on experience and relevant factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

In the process of applying the Society's accounting policies described below, management has made the following judgments that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements:

- (i) The Society classifies certain assets as available-for-sale financial assets and recognises changes in their fair value in other comprehensive income and accumulated in fair value reserve within funds. When the fair value declines, management exercises judgment based on the observable data relating to possible events that may have caused the decline in value to determine whether the decline in value is an impairment that should be recognised in profit or loss. The carrying amount of the Society's available-for-sale financial assets at 31 March 2015 was \$10,214,297 (2014: \$9,480,371).
- (ii) The Society depreciates its property, plant and equipment based on a straight line basis over their expected useful lives. The carrying amount of the Society's property, plant and equipment at 31 March 2015 was \$6,246,933 (2014: \$5,597,071). Changes in the level of usage and market uses could impact the useful lives and residual values of these assets and hence future depreciation charges could be revised.

The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents, other current receivables and payables approximate their respective fair values due to the relatively short-term maturity of these financial instruments.

In the current financial year, the Society has adopted all the new and revised FRS and Interpretations of FRS ("INT FRS") that are relevant to its operations and effective for the current financial year. The adoption of these new and revised FRS and INT FRS did not have any material effect on the financial performance or position of the Society.

### (a) Basis of preparation (cont'd)

New standards, amendments to standards and interpretations that have been issued at the balance sheet date but are not yet effective for the financial year ended 31 March 2015 have not been applied in preparing these financial statements. None of these are expected to have a significant effect on the financial statements of the Society, except as disclosed below:

### FRS 109 Financial Instruments

FRS 109 includes guidance on the classification and measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities and de-recognition of financial instruments. FRS 109, when effective will replace FRS 39 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement. This standard is effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018. The Society will review the requirements of FRS 109 and re-assess the classification and measurement of its financial assets and financial liabilities in accordance with this standard.

### (b) Income recognition

Income comprises the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for the rendering of services, net of goods and services tax, rebates and discounts. Income is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Society, and the amount of income and related expenditure can be reliably measured.

Subscriptions from members and contributions are recognised as income on a straight-line over the subscription period.

Revenue from sale of goods on credit is recognised when goods are delivered and in respect of cash sales, when goods are taken and paid for over the counter.

Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis using the effective interest method.

Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

Income from self financing project is recognised in the period the event occurred.

### (c) Government grants

Government grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. Where the grant relates to an asset, the fair value is recognised in the deferred capital grant on the balance sheet and amortised to profit or loss over the expected useful life of the relevant asset by equal annual instalments.

When the grant related to expenditure item, it is recognised in profit or loss over the period necessary to match them on a systematic basis to the expenditure that it is intended to compensate.

### (d) Employee's benefits

### Defined contribution plans

The Society makes contributions to the Central Provident Fund ("CPF"), a defined contribution plan regulated and managed by the Singapore Government. The Society's contributions to CPF are charged to profit or loss in the period in which the related service is performed.

### Employee leave entitlement

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the balance sheet date.

### (e) Operating leases

Leases where a significant portion of the risks and rewards incidental to ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Payments made under operating leases (net of any incentives received from the lessor) are recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

When an operating lease is terminated before the lease period expires, any payment required to be made to the lessor by way of penalty is recognised as an expenditure in the period in which termination takes place.

### (f) Taxation

Income tax on profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax is recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly to fund, in which case it is recognised in fund.

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred income tax is provided using the liability method, on all temporary differences at the balance sheet date arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on currently enacted or substantively enacted tax rates at the balance sheet date.

Deferred income tax is charged or credited to fund if the tax relates to items that are credited or charged, in the same or a different period, directly to fund.

### (g) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. Subsequent to initial recognition, property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

The cost of property, plant and equipment initially recognised includes its purchase price and any cost that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Dismantlement, removal or restoration costs are included as part of the cost of property, plant and equipment if the obligation for dismantlement, removal or restoration is incurred as a consequence of acquiring or using the asset.

On disposal of a property, plant and equipment, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and its carrying amount is taken to profit or loss.

### (g) Property, plant and equipment (cont'd)

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis to write off the cost of property, plant and equipment over their expected useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

The residual values, estimated useful lives and depreciation method of property, plant and equipment are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at each balance sheet date. The effects of any revision are recognised in profit or loss when the changes arise.

Fully depreciated assets are retained in the financial statements until they are no longer in use.

### (h) Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment at each balance sheet date or whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal of impairment losses recognised in prior years is recorded when there is an indication that the impairment losses recognised for the asset no longer exist or have decreased. The reversal is recorded in profit or loss. However, the increased carrying amount of an asset due to a reversal of an impairment loss is recognised to the extent it does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of amortisation or depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognised for that asset in prior years.

### (i) Inventories

Inventories comprising publication, gifts and souvenir items held for resale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value with cost being determined on a first-in, first-out basis. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less selling expenses.

### (j) Financial assets

The Society classifies its financial assets in the following categories: loans and receivables and available-for-sale. The classification depends on the nature of the assets and the purpose for which the assets were acquired. Management determines the classification of its financial assets at initial recognition.

### Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise when the Society provides money, goods or services directly to a debtor with no intention of trading the receivable. They are included in current assets, except those maturing later than 12 months after the balance sheet date which are classified as non-current assets. Loans and receivables are presented as "Interfundamount due from", "Receivables" and "Fixed deposits, bank and cash balances" in the balance sheet.

### (j) Financial assets (cont'd)

Loans and receivables (cont'd)

Loans and receivables are measured at initial recognition at fair value plus transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less impairment.

An allowance for impairment of loans and receivables is recognised when there is objective evidence that the Society will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Significant financial difficulties of the debtor, probability that the debtor will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default or delinquency in payments are considered indicators that the receivable is impaired. The amount of the allowance is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate. The carrying amount of the asset is reduced through the use of an allowance account, and the amount of the loss is recognised in profit or loss. When a receivable is uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account for the receivables. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited in profit or loss.

### Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated in this category or not classified in any of the other categories. They are included in non-current assets unless management intends to dispose of the assets within 12 months after the balance sheet date.

Purchase and sales of investments are recognised on trade-date - the date on which the Society commits to purchase or sell the asset. Investments are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the Society has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Available-for-sale financial assets are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs and subsequently carried at fair value.

Unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of investments classified as available-for-sale are recognised in the other comprehensive income and accumulated in fair value reserve within funds. When investments classified as available-for-sale are sold or impaired, the accumulated fair value adjustments in the fair value reserve are included in profit or loss.

The fair values of quoted financial assets are based on market price at the balance sheet date. If the market for a financial asset is not active, the Society establishes fair value by using valuation techniques. These included the use of recent arm's length transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, and option pricing models refined to reflect the issuer's specific circumstances.

### (j) Financial assets (cont'd)

Available-for-sale financial assets (cont'd)

The Society assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. In the case of equity investments classified as available-for-sale, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the investment below its cost is considered in determining whether the investments are impaired. If any such evidence exists for available-for-sale financial assets, the cumulative loss is measured as the difference between the acquisition cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that financial asset previously recognised in profit or loss, is removed from the fair value reserve within fund and recognised in profit or loss. Impairment losses recognised in profit or loss on equity investments are not reversed through profit or loss, until the equity investments are disposed of.

### (k) Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include interfund - amount due to, payables (excluding donations received in advance) and monies held in trust. Financial liabilities are recognised on the balance sheet when, and only when, the Society becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instruments. Financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value plus directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised and through amortisation process.

### (l) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Society has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of the amount can be made. Where the Society expects a provision to be reimbursed, the reimbursement is recognised as a separate asset but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain.

### (m) Funds

Unless specifically indicated, fund balances are not represented by any specific assets or liabilities but are represented by all assets of the Society.

### (n) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand, deposits with financial institutions which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value and excludes Monies held in trust.

### 10 Pro Bono, Learning and Support Services

With the support of the Ministry of Law and the Singapore Academy of Law, the Society established the Pro Bono, Learning and Support Services (the "Division"). The Division coordinates and administers all pro bono initiatives of the Society, including the General Pro Bono Services Office ("General PBSO"), Criminal Legal Aid Scheme ("CLAS"), Law Awareness Fund and Bar Memorial Scholarship Fund ("BMSF"). The purpose of the Division is to implement the Society's vision and initiatives as to the provision of pro bono legal services in Singapore.

The Division is registered under the Singapore Charities Act (Charities Registration Number: 2064) and has been conferred the status of an approved Institution of a Public Character. It is exempted from income tax and its donors are granted tax deductions for the donations made to the Division. The amount of tax-deductible receipts for donations collected for the financial year ended 31 March 2015 amounted to \$2,080,531 (2014: \$1,210,614).

### 19 General information

The Society was established in 1967 and took on the name of The Law Society of Singapore in 1970. The Society is managed by a body of persons called the Council of the Society which consists of 15 elected members, as well as 3 members nominated to serve by the Minister for Law. The Council may also nominate 3 further members to serve, if it so decides in the course of the year. Elections to the Council are held every year and all lawyers who hold practising certificates vote at the elections. The members of the Council elect from amongst themselves a President, two Vice Presidents and the Treasurer of the Society. The purposes of the Society and the powers of the Council are described in the Legal Profession Act (Chapter 161).

The principal place of activities is at 39 South Bridge Road, Singapore.

### (b) Financiał risk management

The Society's activities expose it to minimal financial risk due to the nature of its activities and the overall risk management is determined and carried out by the Council of the Society.

#### Foreign exchange risk

As the Society's transactions are all carried out in Singapore dollars, it is not exposed to any foreign exchange risk.

#### Interest rate risk

The Society's income and operating cash flows are substantially independent of changes in market interest rates although it has significant interest-bearing deposits with financial institutions as the interest rates of these deposits are fixed. The Society has no interest-bearing liabilities.

## Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Society.

The Society does not have any significant concentrations of credit risk exposure. The maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying values of each class of financial assets recognised in the balance sheet and comprised mainly of deposits placed with financial institutions.

Financial assets that are neither past due nor impaired

Receivables that are neither past due nor impaired are creditworthy debtors with good payment record with the Society. Fixed deposits and bank balances that are neither past due nor impaired are placed with reputable financial institutions which are regulated and have good credit standing.

Financial assets that are either past due and/or impaired

There are no financial assets that are either past due and/or impaired at the balance sheet date.

#### 20 Financial instruments (cont'd)

### (b) Financial risk management (cont'd)

#### Market price risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of the Society's financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than interest or exchange rates). The Society is exposed to changes in equity price arising from its investment in quoted equity instruments. These equity instruments are quoted on SGX-ST in Singapore and are classified as available-for-sale financial assets.

As at 31 March 2015, the Society's investment in equity instruments amounted to \$2,182,560 (2014: \$2,015,130). A 10% increase/decrease in the underlying equity prices at the balance sheet date would increase/decrease by equity of \$218,256 (2014: \$201,513).

#### Liquidity and cash flow risk

The Council of the Society exercises prudent liquidity and cash flow risk management policies and aims at maintaining an adequate level of liquidity and cash flows at all times.

The financial liabilities of the Society as presented in the balance sheet are due within twelve months from the balance sheet date and approximate the contractual undiscounted payments.

#### (c) Fair values

The Society classifies fair value measurement using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurement.

The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

Level 1 – quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).

Level 3 – inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data.

The Society's available-for-sale financial assets are traded in an active market and are based on quoted market prices at the balance sheet date. These investments are included in the level 1 hierarchy.

The carrying amounts of the other financial assets and financial liabilities recorded in the financial statements approximate their respective fair values due to the relatively short-term maturity of these financial instruments.

### 21 Funds/reserves management policy

The Society's objectives when managing its funds are to safeguard and to maintain adequate working capital to continue as going concern and to develop its principal activities over the longer term.

No changes are made in the objectives, policies or processes during the financial years ended 31 March 2015 and 31 March 2014.

### 25 Relationship with Insolvency Practitioners Association of Singapore Limited ("IPAS")

IPAS is incorporated in Singapore and its principal activities are as follows:

- Provision of a corporate identity and organisation for insolvency practitioners
- Associate, Fellow and Student registration
- Support and advancement of the status and interest of insolvency practitioners
- Provision of recognised qualifications for persons engaged in the practice of insolvency
- Promotion of the technical competence of insolvency practitioners
- Provision of updates on developments in insolvency legislation and proposals and latest insolvency judgments by Singapore Courts and other jurisdictions

IPAS is a company limited by guarantee whereby every member of IPAS undertakes to contribute to meet the debts and liabilities of IPAS in the event of its liquidation to an amount not exceeding \$10 for each member. The members of IPAS are Institute of Singapore Chartered Accountants and the Society.

The Society has 50% representation on the Board of IPAS. However the Society's relationship with IPAS is only to the extent of a loose affiliation and in the event that IPAS is wound up or dissolved and if there are any remaining assets in IPAS after the satisfaction of all IPAS's debts and liabilities, the Society's share of such remaining assets of IPAS as determined by the Board of IPAS will not be received by the Society but will be distributed to such institution or institutions having objects similar to the objects of IPAS.

Consequently, IPAS is not as an associate, a joint venture or an investment of the Society and as such, it is not recognised in the financial statements of the Society.

# 26 Authorisation of financial statements

The financial statements of the Society for the financial year ended 31 March 2015 were authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Council dated 25 September 2015.
